"Mystery Land" in the Laurentian hills of Quebec, which has had considerable newspaper mention during recent years, has been finally relinquished by the Canadian General Council of the Boy Scouts Association.

The island, was developed and fostered by the late Mr. Noulan Cauchon of Ottawa, internationally famous town planning engineer, as a project to angling interest in virgin country camping by Boy Scouts, and with the hope that the camp some day would be used by parties of Scouts coming from all parts of the Dominion.

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Along Canada's Mining Highway

One of the best mediums for the conservatively minded, for participation in the developments along Canada's mining highway, is through the holding companies.

Ventures controls excellent mining enterprises in Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba, and has important interests in the North West areas. Premier Gold has, in addition to British Columbia and Ontario interests, a very important investment in Australia.

Towamag Exploration has interests in copper, silver, gold, lead and zinc, through its important holdings in Alderme Copper, Francoeur Gold and Lake Geneva Mines.

Royalty is a safe medium among the oil holding companies.

Market interest, however, is still concentrated on the developing gold properties. The public memory is still fresh with the spectacular movement in Moneta shares, following diamond drilling results. Federal Kirkland, with one drill started and a second ready to begin, is being watched with great interest. The proximity of its adjoining neighbors—Sylvanite, Toburn and Continental Kirkland is the reason. Jellicoe — in the Little Long Lac Camp — has reported what

promises to be a very interesting development, according to diamond drilling indications. Its rich ore discovery is of importance, not only to Jellicoe, but promises much for Bankfield and Magnet Lake.

Hutchison Lake should provide market news at an early date. Shaft sinking is nearing the first level. Smelter Gold should provide news from its diamond drilling campaign already started.

Underground work on the Kerr Addison and Martin Bird properties in the Larder Lake District of Ontario is creating a big public following for these issues.

In the Quebec Field, Francoeur Gold, Astoria Rouyn, Dempsey Cadillac, Powell Rouyn and Rouyn Reward are likely to provide important mining news.

In the Oil fields the important development has been the formation of the Brown Oil Corporation with finances provided by Eastern capital. The Company is financed to drill three wells on the west flank of Turner Valley. The Company's holdings are regarded as proven acreage. Pacalta Oils is expected to start drilling operations in the Wainwright field at an early date. The Company's Alberta Oil leases approximate 17,480 acres.

The Christian Science Monitor writes:—Few of the chief intellectual developments in America pass entirely unnoticed among the more thoughtful sections of the British public. Idleness Is Termed Work of the Devil

Lives Spent in Merrymaking Unfit Man for Hereafter

New York.—Termining idleness "the devil's work," the Rev. Dr. Malcolm J. MacLeod, retired pastor of the Collegiate Church of St. Nicholas, urged the members of the Middle Collegiate Reformed Church to give their lives a meaning by purposeful activity and kindness.

"The shortness of human life is the ghost at the banquet of human thought," declared Dr. MacLeod. It haunts men amid their bustle and chatter. Of course, an empty life would seem long enough. If you want to make life slow, and that is the devil's work, there are plenty of people who can show you how."

Belief in man's immortality is incompatible with a life spent in merrymaking, said Dr. MacLeod. Therefore, he added, labor should be regarded as the handmaiden of religion, and the human relationships involved should be tempered with kindness.

"Christ, who was ceaselessly busy, understood this. Today we can see people who pass another day after day without exchanging a single word. If they met abroad they would embrace one another. In rural sections families quarrel bitterly about their fences. With life so short, why can't we be kind and considerate in our dealings with our fellow-men?"

Referring again to his belief in man's immortality, Dr. MacLeod asserted that man's earthly life had added importance because it was a preparation for the hereafter.

"We were born to be launched into great eternity just as a ship is made on land to be launched into the sea," he said. "Perhaps if we would listen we would hear a voice saying there is a haven that is our home."
