VILLAGE OF STOUFFVILLE

THE PUBLIC HEALTH NOTICE is hereby given that all residents of Stouffville are required to forthwith clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig styles, water closets, out-buildings and remove therefrom all dirt, manure, and any other substance which may endanger the public health and have the same completed by the 15th day of June next on which day the Sanitary Inspector will commence a general inspection and furthermore take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs between the 15th day of May and the 15th day of November, except in pens at least 70 feet away from any dwelling house and lane and street with floors kept clean from all standing water and regularly cleansed, will be strictly enforced. All citizens are requested to keep their property constantly clean and thoroughly disinfected.

PLAN 7TH CON. ROUTE TO RELIEVE YONGE STREET

Proposed Road Will Be Northern Extension to Sutton of Markham Mt. Albert Strip

Markham-Mt. Albert county road may be extended north over the 7th concession route to Sutton to provide an alternate road to Toronto, it was learned from an authoritative source here.

The proposal has been considered by the Toronto and York good roads committee as a means of taking traffic off Yonge street during the busy summer week-ends.

Residents in East Toronto have found it inconvenient in the past to travel the established Sutton-Newmarket route to the city, especially during the summer months when traffic is at its peak. The only alternative is over township concession roads to Ringwood, a distance of approximately 20 miles. In wet weather these narrow roads are almost impassable.

In the proposed route Toronto-bound traffic would travel through Sutton, out the old "Cataran road" to the 7th concession road. At present the 7th is not built up through North Gwillimbury and part of East Gwillimbury because of a swampy stretch. South of the swamps, however, it is a fine road to its junction with the pavement between Mt. Albert and Sharon.

Cost of building a county road through the swampy area, a distance of three miles, would be given less than the expense of grading the hilly 3th concession route, it was pointed out. The 7th route provides a straight level road for about 10 miles between Sutton and Ballantrae.

COTTAGERS AND FARMERS OFFERED DUST LAYER

MUST PAY 40 P.C. OF COST

Whitchurch Township Council at a special meeting held on Tuesday evening went on record as favoring the policy of granting oil for dust layer to the farmers as well as to the cottagers around the two lakes in the municipality. This year under the latest decree 40 per cent of the cost of oil must be paid by the property owner. In the case of lake areas any group may band together and apply for oil by paying the 40 per cent direct.

The policy heretofore of oiling lake roads at the expense of the whole township, while farmers in various parts close to the road, were smothered in dust, drew wide criticism, and the present arrangement involved will treat all alike.

Reeve Earl Toole campaigned on this policy last nomination day, namely, equal privilege to the farmers and campers, and the present arrangement aims at doing just this thing.

The council all supported the plan, dividing however on the amount to be paid by the individual owner or tenant. Reeve Kidd moved that it be set at 40 per cent for the party immediately benefited, whereas Councillor Leary thought 25 per cent was all the individual should pay. Four voted in favor of 40 per cent payment by ratepayers direct.
