COTTAGERS AND FARMERS OFFERED DUST LAYER

MUST PAY 40 P.C. OF COST

Whitchurch Township Council at a special meeting held on Tuesday evening went on record as favoring the policy of granting oil for dust layer to the farmers as well as to the cottagers around the two lakes in the municipality. This year under the latest decree 40 per cent of the cost of oil must be paid by the property owner. In the case of lake areas any group may band together and apply for oil by paying the 40

per cent_direct. The policy heretofore of oiling lake roads at the expense of the whole township, while farmers in various parts close to the road, were smothered in dust, drew wide criticism, and the present arrangement envolved will treat all alike.

Reeve Earl Toole campaigned on this policy last nomination day, namely, equal privilege to the farmers and campers, and the present arrangement aims at doing just this

The council all supported the plan, dividing however on the amount to be paid by the individual owner or tenant. Reeve Kidd moved that it be set at 40 per cent for the party immediately benefited, whereas Councillor Leary thought 25 per cent was all the individual should pay.
