There is no law to compel a person to destroy the apple worm, but there ought to be. There some trees on the roadside breeding this pest too, and the municipal authorities will be obliged to look after this. Spraying is a sure and effective measure against this worm, which is the cause of all other insects or pests which affect an apple.
