A BLIGHT IN BARLEY

There is anxiety in a number of farm homes in the Alliston dis trict, says the Herald of that town, because of a blight that has appeared in several stands of barley. The leaves of the shoots are turning evening sermons were delivered by white and the plant dies. In some fields where this blight has appeared there is a well defined line between the affected and unaffected areas which makes the mystery of the trouble more difficult to determine. It may be that withe rains of the spring which washed the soil off some of the areas and placed it on others have caused a release of plant foods in some places and made these minerals de-

ficient in others. Were a whiteness of the leaf to appear on an apple tree or even in latest "Customer Control Drier." wheat the condition would be taken to indicate a deficiency in potash in the soil and if it is found that this is the cause of the barley blight the cause may be ascribed to the heavy rains and shifting of soil in the
