STALLIONS to stand for public service must be pure bred, must have passed inspection and be enrolled under the Ontario Stallion Enrolment Act. Certificates are issued to indicate the relative merit.

Mare owners should ask to see the enrolment certificate for their guidance. Ontario and Dominion Governments encourage stallion owners to buy and keep for service the best grade of stallions by paying premiums on stallions carrying Form One and Form Two certificates.

The Ontario Enrolment Act says:

"No one shall stand, travel, or offer for use or sale any stallion that is not pure bred and enrolled."

Township of Uxbridge

Weeds Have No Place in a Progressive Municipality — Do Your Share to Prevent Their Spread The Weed Control Act States Township of Uxbridge.

Clause 5.

Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designated noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

Clause 23

Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses or neglects to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for every such offence.
