The school board opened a large number of applications for the position of teacher to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Doris Ross from the public school staff. The last three years the Board has been eating into a surplus fund because there was not quite enough money raised to meet current expenses, and it felt that the surplus must not be further reduced.

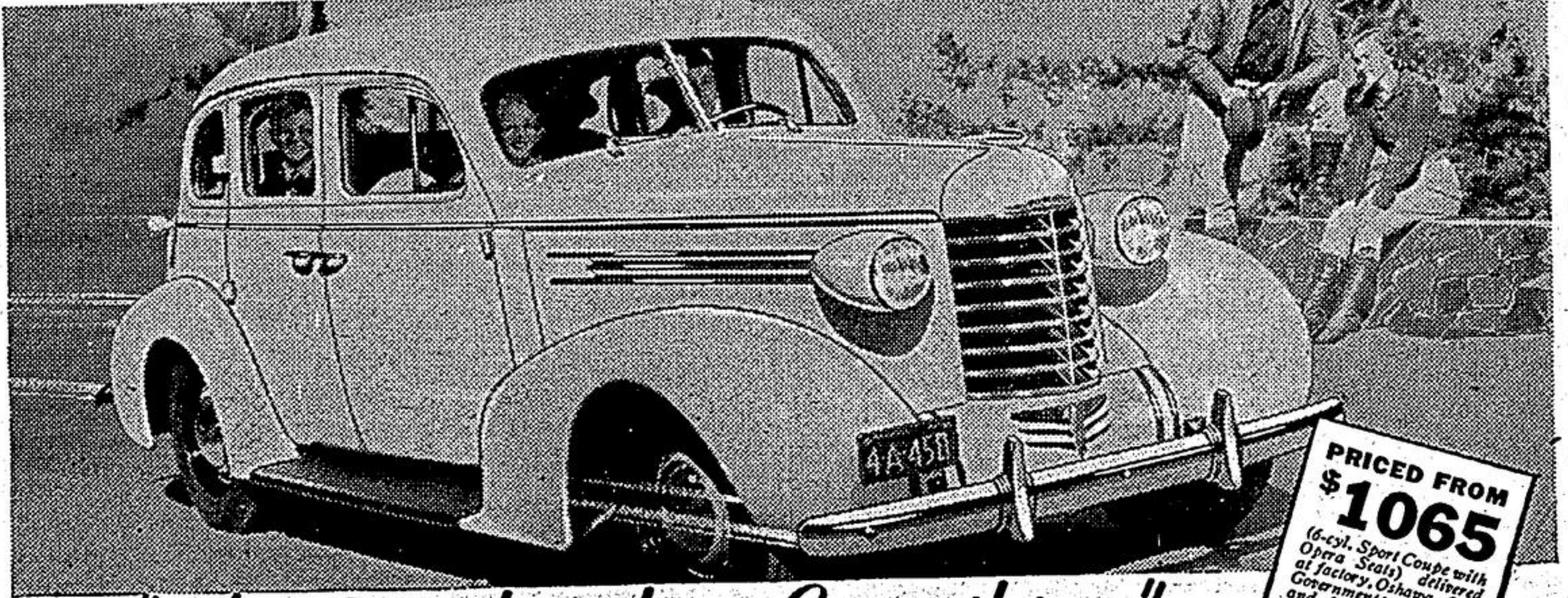
