Township of Uxbridge Weeds Have No Place in a Progressive Municipality - Do Your Share to Prevent Their Spread The Weed Control Act States Township of Uxbridge. Clause 5:

> Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designated noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds. -.

Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses or neglects to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for every such

offence.
