ALLAYING OF DUST IS APPRECIATED BY FARMERS

Farmers seem to appreciate the recent arrangement for placing dust layer on the roads in Whitchurch. Persons living close to the road whose places were becoming unbearable because of dust from ever increasing traffic have been able to secure relief on applying to the Township Council. Over six tons of calcium chloride have been used and more is to be purchased this week. The direct cost to the farmer or resident opposite whose premises the dust layer is put is very small.
 "A great blessing," is the way one farmer expressed his approval of being able to get relief. Others say they would have paid more money rather than be without the calcium.
 Oil has been placed around Wilcox Lake, we understand, but not out to Yonge street, but Musselman's Lake district is still in the dust. The cottagers have been asked to contribute 36c per cottage toward the cost, but through their official spokesmen at the head of the Ratepayers' Association there they have flatly refused to make any direct contribution.

Thos. Robinson Dead

In the passing of Thomas Robinson in his 95th year, on June 29th in his 95th year, on June 29th, Whitchurch Township lost one of its oldest pioneer residents. Mr. Robinson was born in Whitchurch Township in 1842, and lived in this section all his life. He helped to clear the land to make a farm for himself and endure many hardships to make this section what it is today.
 On September 12th, 1870 he married Sarah Brilling. To that union was born two children, Mary (now Mrs. A. B. Sheffer of Bethesda) and Alfred Robinson of Aurora, and one adopted daughter, Viola (now Mrs. Parker Smith of Aurora).
 The funeral took place on Friday, Service in Heise Hill Church was conducted by Mr. Winger of Gormley and Rev. Mr. Westcott of Aurora. Interment took place in Heise Hill cemetery.

Weed Warning

Township of Uxbridge
 Weeds Have No Place in a Progressive Municipality—Do Your Share to Prevent Their Spread
 The Weed Control Act Statutes Township of Uxbridge.
 Clause 5.
 Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designated noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.
 Clause 23
 Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses or neglects to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for every such offence.
