SOW DAWSON'S REGISTERED SEED

In connection with the Fall Wheat Improvement Program, which has been in progress during the past two months, approximately 100 farmers in Simcoe County have purchased a total of 1,050 bushels of Registered Dawson's Golden Chaff Wheat O.A.C. No. 61 for this fall's seeding. The seed was secured through the North and South Simcoe

offices of the Ontario Department of Agriculture from the following growers: A. A. McArthur & Son, Stayrs; Thos. Kidnie Son, Alliston; Mr. and Mrs. E. Ruthven, Alliston; R. J. McCormick, Paris, and Maurice Hammell, Markham.

Six Agriculture Societies, namely: Oro, Barrie, Beeton, Cookstown, Alliston and Nottawasaga, lent their support to the scheme by organizing field crop competitions. A total of \$450 in prizes will be awarded the contestants immediately following the holding of the 1938 fall fairs.

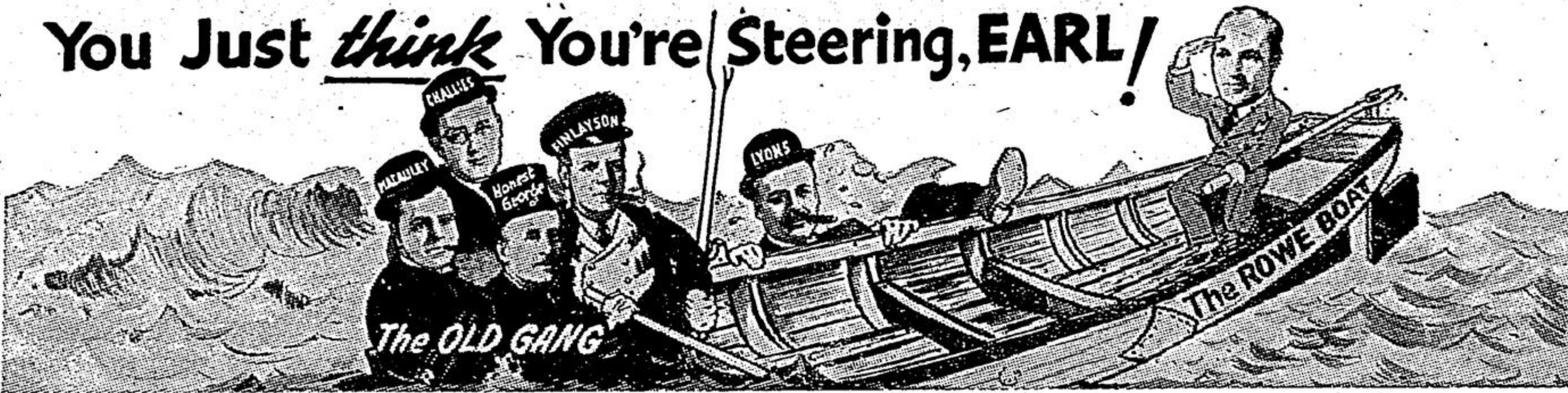
