E MORAL ISSUE IN THE DRINK OBLEM (International Temperte Sunday). - Romans 13:12-14; Corinthians 6:9-11; Galatians 5:

16-24. GOLDEN TEXT-Walk by the irit, and ye shall not fulfill the lust the flesh. Galatians 5:16. THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING

Time.-The epistle of Paul to the mans was written about A.D. 57. First Epistle to the Corinthians s written about 59 A.D., while the istle to the Galatians was written obably in the year 61 A.D.

Place.-The epistle to the Romans as written to Rome from the city Corinth, in Greece; the First Episto the Corinthians was written om the city of Ephesus; while the pistle to the Galatians was written om the city of Corinth.

12. The night is far spent, and the ly is at hand. (See Thess. 5:5). The assage may refer to our Lord's First dvent, when the darkness of heathnism began to pass away and the ay of light and gospel purity comenced; it may also refer to the aproaching day when the Lord Jesus hrist would come back again. Let therefore cast of the works of arkness. "No doubt the word darkess suggests also 'the powers of the arkness, the personal spiritual 'rul-

oul and intensify its tendencies to vil. The habit resulting from these ceds is here figured as a night robe hich is to be put off as the sleeper ses to conflict." And let us put on ne armor of light. "There is the ght of sincerity, the light of purity, he light of love, the light of joy.

13. Let us walk becomingly, as in he day; not in revelling. And drunenness. Not in chambering. (Proessor Moffat translates this word debauchery.") And wantonness. It heans not only licentiousness, but lawless insolence and riotous exess." Not in strife. That is, conention, whether it be at home, in chool, among neighbors, in social ircles, in business, or in a church. nd jealousy.

14. But put ye on the Lord Jesus hrist. Christian life is not one empof the things of the world so much s it is one filled with the things of ie Lord. We shall not walk in darkess, if we put on the Lord Jesus hrist. And make not provision for ne flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof. Let the evil thing die of famine. et the ungodly suggestion perish for neer lack of food. Kill your spirital enemies by starvation. This apears to be the principle advocated by ne great apostle for the culture of ne spiritual life.

Or know ye not that the unrightous shall not inherit the kingdom of od? Unrighteousness is wrong dong of any kind. A person who lives unrighteousness, the apostle cleartells us here, and elsewhere, is one ho cannot enter into the kingdom God. Be not deceived: neither prnicators, nor idolaters, nor adultrers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of nemselves with men. 10. Nor nieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards. or revilers, nor extortioners, shall therit the kingdom of God.

11. And such were some of you, ut ye were washed. It possibly eans that when they were baptized, aving accepted the Lord Jesus hrist, they deliberately put away he filthiness of these sins from their ves. But ye were sanctified, but e were justified. "It is best to take anctified' in the sense of dedicated God, and 'justif.ed' as referring to he actual, moral righteousness of fe, which is brought about by union ith Christ. In the name of the ord Jesus Christ, and in the Spirit our God. No matter how great, deep, or powerful, the sin which ost easily besets us, the three perons of the Godhead can certainly abdue this sin, and deliver us forver from its power.

And ye shall not fulfil the lust of he flesh. The meaning simply is ife in its outgoing shall not const in indulgence of carnal affections eing otherwise occupied, preocculed, filled up."

17. For the flesh lusteth against e Spirit, and the Spirit against the esh; for these are contrary the one the other; that ye may not do the

things that ye would. 18. But if ye are led by the Spirit, ye are not under the law. Paul does not mean that. we shall live a life in which the flesh plays no part, but that we shall not be slaves to fleshly desires, but shall live in our bodies as the Holy Spirit dictates, not as bodily desires dictate. This conflict is not present in the lives of unbelievers.

19. Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these: fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness. 20. Idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousies, wraths, factions, divisions, parties. 21. Envyings, drunkenness, revellings, and such like; of which I forewarn you, even as I did forewarn you, that they who practise such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God. A fourfold classification of the fifteen sins here mentioned has been suggested: (1) sensual vices; (2) religious vices connected with heathendom; (3) malevolent vices, enmities, strife, jealousies, etc. (4) vices of excess or intemperance. Walk in the Holy Spirit

What should be given the greater emphasis in this lesson is not the vices which we are to put away, and deny, and triumph over, though these certainly should be spoken of, but the meaning of and the daily experience of the glorious privilege of walking in the power and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is a person, the Third Person of the Godhead. It is by the Holy Spirit that we are indwelt. As a person, he has a most intimate knowledge of each one of us. As the Holy Spirit, his desires for us are always the most

22. But the fruit of the Spirit is. "All these graces spring out of one living root. The origin of this fruit is the Holy Spirit, not man's spirit, but the Holy Spirit himself. Those who are led by the Spirit not only do not do the works of the flesh, but they bring forth the fruit of the Spirit." Love. This stands first, the root of all other graces, love for God and love for one another. Joy. "Joy is opposed to dullness, despondency, indifference, and all the destructions and remorses which are wrought by the works of the flesh. This joy is the spring of energy, and praise wells out of the joyful heart. Peace. This is the first peace with God, which has been obtained for us by the Lord Jesus Christ. This peace leads to perfect tranquility in the human heart. Longsuffering. "It enables us to bear injury without at once avenging ourselves." Kindness. The word means "the soft answer," "a loving and sympathetizing temper." Goodness. It is difficult to distinguish between goodness and kindness, though probably the latter word means the actual, visible manifestation and exercise of the virtue of kindness. Righ here one might remember that love, joy, and peace are virtues that we have in ourselves by the Holy Spirit, without particular regard to others, except God; while longsuffering, kindness, and goodness, are never developed except as we are in contact with others. They are not virtues that have to do with ourselves as we are living among men and women.

23. Meekness. "A grace of the soul which consists in habitual submission to the dealings of God, arising from the sense of his greatness and the mind's own readiness to sin. Hence then, we are to pass over the insults and wrongs inflicted by men as permitted by God, and a part of his discipline." That is, the holding in of the passions and appetites. Against such there is no law. You can never find any law on any of the statute-books of any Christian nation legislating against the virtues here enumerated.


24. And they that are of Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with the passions and the lusts thereof. By crucifying the flesh and its passions and lusts is meant taking a deliberate and positive stand against their domination and their incitements, a reckoning of one's self to be dead indeed unto sin, but to be alive unto God.

Competition Perils Norway Whaling



Prof. Stauffer said the find was made by his wife in a bed of clay at the foot of a cliff near Lake City, in Southeastern Minnesota.

The 31/2 ounce stone is a piece of pre-giacial flint from a formation that is geologically known as shakopee limestone. It evidently had been swal lowed with the dinosaur's food, the geologist said. Its highly polished, and smooth surface, said Dr. Stauffeur, was the result of the muscular action of the gizzard over a considerable period of time.

Often as much as 300 to 400 pounds of such stones were swallowed by the reptiles which ranged from 80 to 100 feet in length and weighed up to 30 tons, the geologist said.

1937 Buggy Whips Were Expensive

Tableware Was Cheaper; Spoons S Cents a Dozen

A bit topsy-turvy, according to modern standards - but the good old days had their points.

Wagon whips, and curry combs were in greater demand than silverware, to judge by prices, and foodstuffs were go cheap that a dollar bill bought enough to lead you down like a packhorse.

Whisky, according to an 1837 account book turned up-at the Bird-in-Hand General Store in Upper Merion Township, Pennsylvania, sold then at 121/2 cents a quart, although you could get a better grade at 16 cents.

"Segars" went at eight for 2 cents; a dozen teaspoons cost S cents: one dozen eggs, 1212 cents; one pound of ham. 13 cents. But the price of a buggy whip was \$7 cents and of a horas collar \$1.00.

Wells Prophesies 1940 "Plane War"

Noted English Writer is on First American Lecture Tour

H. G. Wells arriving last week in New York for his first lecture tour in the United States said he did not believe that "you'll have the big airplane. war which I predicted until 1940."

"You'll continue to have the sort of scraps you're having today but there won't be the line-up of the various nations until certain nations are ready in 1940," he said.

Need for Widespread Education Mr. Wells recalled that he had intended to lecture here in 1921 on the "salvaging of civilization," but became ill of pneumonia.

"Now, in 1937," he said, "I am here to say much the same thing in a more expanded way. I think there is a great need for wide-spread education if democracy is to save itself from the forces that threaten it."

"I hope to see Henry Ford in Detroit," he said, "and I hope to see President Roosevelt, if he is not too busy to take notice of me." Dangerous Game

He thought that this country was exercising an important stabilizing influence on the world, and that European leaders were playing a "dangerous game of bluff and anything can hap-

Dog Owners' Group Want "Pooch Paths"

New York has bridle paths for horses, cycle roads for bicycles, so why not "pooch paths" for dogs. That is the suggestion of Martin Nussbaum, president of the Dog Owners' Protective Association, which has neither dues nor profits.

The organization proposes to combat the growing tendency of apartment building owners to bar tenants with dogs. It offers paths in or near apartment house grounds where the tenants may take their pets for a walk.
