HIGHWAY PAVING STARTS IN SPRING

It is reported that paving of the new highway through Brown Hill, Baldwin and Mount Albert to join the highway at Sutton will begin as soon as weather conditions are suitable. About 100 men are on the job at present clearing away brush and refuse on the road south of Brown Hill.

The new highway from Beaver-ton will come to the east end of Sutton, turn south and continue through Baldwin, Brown Hill and Mount Albert and enter Toronto at the east end, possibly by Kennedy Road or Kingston Road, it is believed. It will pass through Ballantrae and Ringwood.

The highway will relieve the heavy traffic on Yonge St. and also from Newmarket north to Sutton, which reaches a high peak during the summer months.

This new route was taken over about two years ago by the county, by grading, surveying and widening the road in some places. A provincial highway official stated that construction would commence as soon as the weather would permit.
