Uxbridge Township Council met on Saturday, June 11th, at Goodwood.

Communications read as follows:

Ontario Municipal Board approving of by-law and other papers re the issuing debentures up to \$2,000 to build a school in S.S. No. 10. The bylaw was passed.

J. A. P. Marshall, Chief Engineer of Municipal Roads stating that \$7,000, would be the limit of expenditure on our roads to receive any subsidy. This will cover all road and bridges, snow shovelling, wire fence bonus, and superintendents. The council had in their appropriation bylaw asked for an expenditure of \$9,000, but that will have to be cut down.

Department of Health stated rag weed was a great menace to health, claiming that 80 per cent of the hay fever is caused by the pollen. They asked for the co-operation of the people at large particularly in rural districts, in its destruction.

At 2 p.m. the council resolved into a Court of Revision on the Assessment Roll. There were only three appeals, all being on buildings that have been removed from the properties. Mr. George Catherwood had his assessment lowered \$300 on west half lot 25, con. 7. John Alsop was lowered \$100, the third appeal being several days late coming in to the clerk was not considered by the Court. This was on an expensive building in Brookdale. Three dogs were added and two struck off, four names were added which will only affect the Voters' List.
