Local Honey Crop Ten Days Early

New honey from the apiaries of J. L. Byer & Sons (8th concession Markham) was in town this week, which is fully ten days ahead of the average year. This of course, is in line with all other harvests in this section. However, the thing that will strike you most forcibly about this year's honey from the Byer apiaries is not the time it was harvested but rather the rare quality or flavor of the honey. "There has been an abundance of alsike and sweet clover, and the bees have had ample to work on," explained Mr. J. L. Byer to The Tribune. "The early extraction this year is just in keeping with the other field crops," he continued.

The Byer apiaries are stretched across four counties, and occupy 21 acres of land between York, Ontario, Wentworth and Victoria. There is an advantage in having the apiaries spread over a considerable area. If crop conditions are poor in one part they may be good in another and thus the firm which enjoys a sale of considerable tonnage each year is assured a crop somewhere with which to carry on.

Prices this year are expected to remain normal, although it is a little early to offer estimates along this line. However, the rare quality and color of the first extraction is most striking, and as orders are turned in for a trial pail many will confirm our estimate along this line.

"A Car Is Like A Cat"
