May Peg Wheat Price

Ottawa, July 19—The Dominion guaranteed minimum price for wheat may be set as low as 70 or 75 cents per bushel for the ensuing Western crop year beginning August 1. The government is expected to announce the guaranteed price within the next two or three weeks.
 While the suggested price is considerably lower than the 90 cent per bushel guaranteed price which has obtained for the past two years the King government, it is understood, feels compelled to take into consideration the probable price at which Canada's expected crop this year of from 300 to 350,000,000 bus. can be disposed of in the world markets.
