screened windows on three sides with convenient storm shutters. The cabins are located on the side of a hill overlooking the water. An added attraction not always noticed by visitors is a large open stone fireplace located by the side of the lake, and provided with picnic tables.

The new stables and chicken houses are all modernly equipped. The water is analyzed by the government and the milk is pasteurized.

Each season the camp houses over 1700 girls and each year the number is increasing. Mr. Williams told the Tribune. This present week there are 95 in camp. Some forty per cent of the girls are direct Eaton employees while the others are friends who are allowed in, on paying the necessary fees. The campers come from all over the Dominion and even from the United States, from Winnipeg, Montreal, Sarnia, Windsor, the Maratimes, Illinois, Michigan and Indiana. A similar camp is conducted for the men at Scarborough Bluffs.

Over ten are employed on the staff to keep the camp in order, operate the farm see that the girls carry out the regular routine and duties. Miss Elizabeth Price of Toronto is the camp Supervisor and Mrs. Gardner the head chef, a position which she has held for the past fourteen years.

A systematic routine must be carried out each day the Tribune was told. The girls must rise at 7.45 and participate in the flag raising at 8.20. Eight-thirty is breakfast after which each must return to her cabin to tidy up. The call for "lights out" comes at 10.30 in the evening. Four Camp Counsellors are selected from the Eaton's Girls' Club, one from the University of Toronto and a registered nurse from the General Hospital, Hamilton. All counsellors must have previous camp experience.

As to the activities, they are practically unlimited. To begin with there is sailing, supervised by Miss Elinore Keyes of Toronto. A sixteen-foot dingy is used for instruction. Crew and Skipper awards are given to those passing tests in sailing. Time races are held from time to time over a triangular course. Swimming is also supervised by Miss Keyes, as is golf. A nine hole course is provided and numerous tournaments are held. Canoeing is looked after by Miss Wilson of Edmonton, who gives instruction in paddling and the care and handling of a canoe. Miss Cook of Toronto supervises the riding, for which ten splendid saddle horses are provided. Miss Dorothy Earl and Dorothy Reid have charge of the social work, which consists of camp-fires, sing songs, roasts and other various programs. Divine worship is held each Sunday morning with the campers and the Counsellors conducting the service.

"To feed just such a host of invigorated young ladies as attend this summer spot each year requires considerable planning," said Mrs. Gardner, on whose shoulders rests the job of planning meals weeks in advance. Over 75 per cent of the supplies not produced on the farm are purchased right here in Stouffville and to give you some idea of the quantities required we quote a few figures. There are consumed some 525 quarts of milk a week, over 5,000 eggs a season, 385 loaves of bread a week, 17 pies a week and 500 lbs. of cut cake. Potatoes run up to 55 bushels a season and fish over 700 lbs. a season. Mrs. Gardner has three and sometimes four assistants in catering to the appetites of the camp.

The rates for such a splendid outing as this adjacent summer spot provides are most reasonable and the city girls are high in their praise. Thus the camp has grown over the years to its present proportions and is expected to continue to do so.

When speaking of the Horticultural Society's big concert on Friday night of this week we find it is sufficient recommendation simply to say that McLeod Bros. who were responsible for the Lion's Club concert, on July 1st have chosen the artists for this occasion, also. In addition the Stouffville Orchestra will be on hand early and late to provide special music.
