Work Continues on the 4th Con.

The Toronto and York Roads Commission continue to work on the 4th concession of Markham in Whitchurch Township in order to provide a suitable road which will relieve the heavy traffic on Yonge street north to Lake Simcoe.

Within the past few weeks two miles and a half of pavement has been laid down while six more miles have been resurfaced. The concession, which is a county road, is now completely paved from Don Mills road, East York, to Victoria Square. From the Square to Pleasantville the gravel road has been graded and will be made ready for future paving. There is already a two-mile paved county road running north-west from Pleasantville, connect with the route with Newmarket.

To make way for that the commissioners are eliminating a dangerous jog at Gormley and will remove another at Pleasantville.

Sixty-six feet wide, the fourth concession is expected by the commissioners to be one of the best road arteries leading out of Toronto. When completely paved it will be used by all north-bound traffic starting from the eastern sections of the city of Toronto, eliminating the present congestion on Yonge street.

FISH FROM QUEBEC FOR PARK IN WEST

Gamest of all fresh water fish, a quantity of small-mouth bass from the mountain waters of Quebec were recently carried to their new habitat in the cool depths of Lake Waskesiu in Prince Albert National Park. Travelling in a specially equipped express car supplied by the Canadian National Railways, the bass were shipped to Prince Albert, Sask., and on arrival were transported the remaining distance by truck.
