Open Verdict in Hosking Inquest

A coroner's jury enquiring into the death of Henry Hosking of Ballantrae, returned an open verdict at the inquest held in Stouffville, on August 10. Harold Sanders, acting for the crown, conducted the investigation. The verdict of the jury was that Hosking came to his death on the 8th concession of Markham on August 4th, by accidentally stepping in front of a car, driven by Kirby Hackney, of Markham. Constable Daniels of Markham, who conducted the investigation at the scene of the tragedy, found no skid marks on the pavement, only one dent in the right front fender and slight evidence of the man's head coming in contact with the hinge of the right door.

Kirby Hackney, driver of the car, told the jury that he was proceeding north at a speed of not more than 25 miles an hour. He saw the man walking near the edge of the road and pulled over slightly to pass him. However just as he pulled up to within a few feet of the pedestrian, the lad seemed to side-step, and was caught by the right fender which slid him backwards striking his head on the door hinge.

Evidence was given by Dr. N. F. Tomlinson of Claremont, who conducted the post-mortem, Sam McKewen of Stouffville, Mr. Blake of Ringwood, Constable Gayman of Markham Township and Constable Barraclough of Richmond Hill.
