Strike Whitchurch Tax Rate

Chief items of business at the regular meeting of Whitchurch Council last week was the striking of the tax rate which is much the same as last year. The general township purpose levy will be 7.25 mills which will stand at 6.25 with the government subsidy off. This is a decrease of half a mill from last year. County rate is down from 8.5 to 5.5 and although some of this is only a re-arrangement of the secondary school costs, there will still be a saving of several thousand dollars to the township.

A written request was received from Musselman's Lake Ratepayers Association to take steps to repair a number of bad holes in the 9th con. from the Lake to Stouffville. One particularly dangerous spot was mentioned as the culvert at the entrance to Valley Road just south of the Lake.

There will be no open season for pheasants in the Township of Whitchurch in the coming year, was the word received from the Department of Game and Fisheries. Due to the recent damage inflicted by vandals on Shadow Lake property it was deemed wise by Council to have Constable Windsor patrol the Eaton Lake, especially over the week-ends.

Motion was brought in by Councillors Herman Kidd and Herb Wells that a by-law be drawn up to prohibit the setting of road-side fires in the township.

A report of garbage and parking conditions at Wilcox Lake brought the general demand from councillors for a clean-up around the Lake. Each booth should be requested to keep the refuse from in front of their stands, said Reeve Earl Toole. They must meet with the approval of the officer patrolling the beach, or the consequences might have serious bearing on their obtaining a license for the next year, the reeve continued. Constable Williams was to be requested to have all objectionable parking devices along the lake shore removed.
