SHORT COURSE AT VICTORIA SQUARE

The one month Short Courses in Agriculture and Home Economics for York County will be held this year at Victoria Square from January 3rd to 27th, where accommodation has been arranged in the Community Hall and basement of the United Church. From all reports, there promises to be a large enrolment as the residents of this progressive district realize this is their opportunity. This is the 27th year of these courses and since there has never been one at Victoria Square, a number of the young people who have attended similar courses elsewhere, are urging any who possibly can, to plan to be on hand the first day and every day.

The classes in Agriculture will include a practical discussion of the problems of live stock, crop, feeds and feeding, dairying, poultry, farm conveniences, soils, fertilizers, insect pests, plant diseases, etc., with practice in live stock judging, killing and culling of poultry, seed cleaning and judging.

The Home Economics classes will include Household Science and Clothing. The former will embrace a study of foods and cookery and the various phases of household management while the clothing class will cover a study of cloths, clothing, use of patterns and the actual making of a dress by each girl.

Although these courses are primarily for the young people over 16 years of age, anyone may enroll. A registration fee of 50c is charged for the purchase of practice material. The class for the ladies is particularly for girls and young married women but the boys' classes will welcome any of the farmers, any or all of the time.

The classes will be under the direction of W. M. Cockburn, Agricultural Representative, whose efforts in bringing this to Victoria Square, will be appreciated. He will be assisted by Mr. F. D. Willows of Lynn for the boys' work and Miss Cora Lush of Milton and Miss Ann Scott of Nottawa for the girls' work.
