

# Stouffville Juniors Lose Close Game to Markham

Stouffville Junior hockeyists were considerably more glorious in their overtime defeat at the hands of Markham on Tuesday night than when they absorbed a 7-2 shilacking down in the Markham arena last Thursday.

On the play both teams appeared equally entitled to the win, but the dice fell to Markham 3-2. Stouffville showed their best burst of ability during the first period, when they continually bottled Markham up in their own end of the ice, and were purely outlucked on their scoring chances. Ivan Goudie, newly recruited wingman on the local line-up proved to be the shining light of this opening Stouffville onslaught, when he banged home Harper's pass from the corner, for the first counter. Markham came right back in the mid-session and were just four minutes tying it up.

In the overtime the visitors had a slight edge on the play and took the lead at the three minute mark. Just five minutes later, Joe Austin, got his stick on a pass, directly in front of the Markham goal, and taking plenty of time, made no mistake in laying the rubber in the corner. This brilliant success was shortlived however, as with only seconds to play, Markham hung up another, to take the decision 3-2.

Stouffville squad showed considerable improvement, and a combination that has hitherto been lacking. The two new faces Goudie on the second line, and Grossmith on defence, proved strengthening factors. Markham club are certainly an improvement over their last year winless aggregation, and will be a speedy crowd to be reckoned with before the schedule ends.

Hockey aplenty seems to be in store for fans in these parts this winter. No less than three

leagues are operating in the vicinity, and Stouffville have representatives in all divisions. Stouffville Juniors attempting to make their way in a 4-team O.H.A. division, while the intermediates are entered in both the Uxbridge and Markham leagues.

In Uxbridge this year the teams have been divided in two sections. Group "A" is composed of players who have seen former play in the league, while "B" has the newcomers, but boys who have shown marked hockey ability. The ten teams entered are -A- Whitby, Stouffville, Goodwood, C.Y.M.C. and Sunderland. -B- Sandford, Goodwood, Leasdale and Uxbridge. Stouffville won their first game at Uxbridge last week, defeating Whitby 4-2.

Owing to the impassable condition of many of the roads the doubleheader of Goodwood and Sunderland, Uxbridge, Reach to be played at Uxbridge Tuesday night, was postponed.

Markham League opened up Friday night with Armadale defeating Scarboro 6-4, and Thornhill defeating Nationals 3-0. Stouffville will play their first game in the this group on Friday against Markham. The other half of the double bill will be supplied by Scarboro and Thornhill.

Aurora appear to have begun their triumphal parade once gain this year, having chalked up three stright wins so far, for a total of 23 goals. They will play here next Monday night, and if last season's performances mean anything, the fans in for a real game when these two clubs get together.

A movement is underway to organize a juvenile hockey league

composed of Stouffville, Richmond Hill and Willowdale. Boys who feel they would like a chance in this league should report to the management at Stouffville Arena this Friday evening for practice at 7 p.m. Lads 18 and under are eligible.
