Aurora Handed Their First Defeat of Season

Locals Come Through Hard-Struggle 2-1

And the mighty have fallen—at least until Friday night, when Stouffville will invade the Aurora camp for a return game following a close 2-1 decision the local puckchasers took here on Monday night from the Yonge Street O.H.A. juniors.

The chagrin of the last three straight losses Stouffville have suffered was completely smothered by the flush of victory over Aurora's highly-touted squad.

Although the first period spelled Stouffville all the way, Aurora picked the corner with the opening counter in the dying moments. One penalty to each club was meted out in this opening period.

The mid-session was Aurora's by quite a margin, while the locals fought grimly and missed several good scoring chances, with soft ice making the puck uncontrollable. Despite three penalties Aurora kept a commanding edge on the play. The condition of the ice made it necessary to play the game of shooting into the corner and coming in for the rebound. Aurora showed superior tactics at this brand of hockey, while the Stouffvillites failed to take advantage of having the puck in the opposing territory and preferred to lay back, which allowed Aurora to organize their return rush.

However hope freshened near the five minute mark of the last frame when Ken Rusnell broke through alone to beat McGhee and even the count. Eddie Crouch's boys were hard-pressed to hold the deadlock for a time and at one point it appeared to be all over, only to have Joe Austin hook the Aurora player from behind just as he was about to bang the winning goal past Hoover. A penalty-shot for Aurora dribbled weakly to one side of the net.

With little more than three minutes to go and Aurora bombarding Hoover from all sides, Austin and Rusnell broke down the right boards, went around Bone, Aurora's lone defenseman, and let fly at McGhee who stopped the shot, but Grossmith swooped in from the opposite wing and banged home the rebound for the winning goal. It was a smart play all the way and deserving of the counter.

Aurora fought desperately to come back, but failed to make

the grade, and went down to their first defeat of the season. Stouffville will play East York a Unionville on Thursday and make their bow on Aurora ice Friday night, Jan. 13.

Stouffville lost their second engagement with East York, on Unionville ice last Thursday night by the score of 6-3.

Ken Rusnell local right-winger on the first string line of the Juniors has been nursing an injured knee the past few weeks which has been slowing up this big boy considerably. He is expected to be going strong again when Stouffville step on Aurora ice Friday night.

This Friday night Stouffville Intermediates will meet Nationals, and Thornhill will line up against Armadale at Markham.

Whitchurch Hockey League is opening their schedule with a doubleheader here Thursday night, Jan. 12 White Rose vs. Lemonville, and Vandrof vs. King City. Games commence at 8 p.m. Admission 15c.

One more hockey team has been added to Stouffville's representation this year, with the entry of a juvenile squad. The team under the management of Reg Button, will play in a group including Richmond Hill and Aurora. A similar league operating in the north includes Bradford, Sutton, Newmarket and Roche's Point. This new league brings organized hockey to all lads 17 and under.

Both mild and cold weather have crippled the hockey schedules so far, but we have hopes that the weatherman will pep

things up in the near future. The Uxbridge Association has been held up now on two occasions, due to blocked roads, and this week again with the January thaw.
