Stouffville Absorb a 12-4 Lacing at Markham

Suffer Fourth Straight Junior Defeat

Stouffville Junior hockeyists slipped still deeper into the cellar position on Monday night when they were defeated on Markham ice 12-4.

The game had all the trimmings of a real good shiny match, and at no time did either team show any great display of organized hockey ability. The local passing was very erratic and the idea of covering up in front of the net seemed to have gone with the wind.

Bangay scored the opening goal for Markham at the 8 minute mark, taking Goudie's badly aimed pass just inside the blue line, to transform a Stouffville rush into a Markham goal. Baker for Markham made it 2-0 just a minute later, and Laurie scored again before the end of the period to make it 3-0.

Austin and Rusnell combined in the mid-session to score the best looking goal of the game, carrying neatly through the defence and passing just outside the crease and bang it past goalie Schad. Rusnell who was practically at a stand-still all night, partially redeemed himself by this effort. Stouffville seemed utterly unable to cope with the opposition who counted four more in this second period on goals by Wolland, Baker and Laurie. The locals notched two with Markham a man short to make it 7-3.

The final period saw the green and white still gunning for goals and five more by Bangay, Co-

burn, Baker and Laurie, put the game on ice.

Both goal-tenders turned in a good night, and the high score can in no way be credited to them. The teams played an inferior brand of hockey that gave the handful of fans present little to cheer about.

This was the second game lost by Stouffville to Markham in four days, they having taken last Friday night's encounter here 6-2. Stouffville will journey to Aurora this Friday night and finish up the schedule with East York here next Tuesday night.
