Open membership: anyone may secure a share or shares.

Democratic control: each shareholder will have one vote.

Fair return on capital invested: limit of 4 per cent.

Surplus earnings, when operating costs, interest on capital, reserve and educational funds, have been paid, will be returned to the shareholders in proportion to their purchases.

The finance committee has decided to undertake a canvas of the district at once.
