It is agreed by those responsible for the buying club that the time has come to organize a co-operative company with full-time staff, permanent warehouse and stock of goods on hand.

During the past two winters an educational program of discussion groups has been used to lay the foundation for this new organization. A considerable number of responsible citizens have taken a keen interest.

When a sufficient number of shareholders and a sufficient amount of capital have been accrued organization will be set up on the Rockdale Plan. Features of the proposed co-operative will be

Open membership: anyone may secure a share or shares

Democratic control: each shareholder will have one vote.

Fair return on capital invested: limit of 4 per cent. Surplus earnings, when operating costs, interest on capital, reserve and educational funds, have been paid, will be returned to the shareholders in proportion to their

purchases. The finance committee has decided to undertake a canvas of the district at once.
