

# Stouffville and Goodwood Play to a 1-1 Draw

Goodwood have finally met a Stouffville team that appears every bit their equal.

It took seventy minutes of gruelling hockey on slushy ice in their last scheduled game in Uxbridge Arena on Friday, to make this fact convincing.

The final score after the evening's fun tallied 1-1, which still leaves Goodwood one notch higher up in the ladder when it comes to choosing play-off positions.

The play was very even and see-sawed from one end of the rink to the other, with each team counting one goal to support their argument.

With Holden and Redshaw each doing time in the cooler for roughing, Herb Simpson and Art Wideman combined to slip in Goodwood's counter at the 5.15 mark. It was rather a peculiar goal coming off Simpson's stick behind the net, to seemingly strike Wideman and go in the net. The remaining 10 minutes of the period Stouffville's repeated attacks were turned back by goalie Paxton, and the stout Goodwood defense in front.

The applause from the seven hundred fans present seemed unlimited and they had hardly settled down for the second period, when from the face-off, Laurie and Austin cut loose. Laurie displayed amazing speed in getting down around the Goodwood defense, and giving Austin the pass to score on help-less, and unprotected Paxton, after just ten seconds of play. Laurie fairly "flew" down the ice. It was a diamond-studded effort, and richly deserving of

the acclaim of the many Stouffville fans. There were three penalties in this mid-session, two to Stouffville and one to Goodwood, but no damage was done.

But it took seventy minutes of die offensive in the last period, and the overtime, but despite numerous close calls for both sides, neither was able to chalk up a winning goal.

The ice was in very bad shape, and was probably accountable for the score being what it was. Forster, in the Stouffville nets, gave his usual spectacular performance, after the Redshirts got their goal. Reesor for Goodwood, and Morden for Stouffville, were "tops" defensively and both took their turns carrying the puck out. The main offensive lines were about on a par in this contest with their checking and offensive antics. Due to the slow ice Laurie, Austin and Simpson lacked a little of the old pepper, usually displayed by these ace forwards, but from a Stouffville point of view, the Austin, Laurie, Holden line provided probably the biggest scoring threat of the evening. Laurie and Simpson had the most chances in front of the nets, but they found goalies Forster and Paxton always equal to the occasion.

## PROGRAM OF TREE PLANTING WOULD EMPLOY THOUSANDS

A gigantic works project of reforesting thousands of unfer-tilile acres in the rural areas of York County, presumably Vivian and Ballantrae districts, to cut down increasing relief rolls and provide wages for work instad of direlt relief was advocated by York County officials.

Such a project, county officials contended, would be far more beneficial to suburban and rural municipalities in the county than the erection of public buildings.

"New buildings will only give work to a few men, but a tree-planting program will put thousands to work," declared members of the County Agricultural Committee. "We need projects that will materially cut our relief rolls; something to help our unemployed youths as well as craftsmen."

York County Reforestation Committee headed by James Rennie has appeared before the provincial authorities on numerous occasions with a view to having their northern sandy lands converted into forests. Unless a project of magnitude is instituted now, the committee feels the whole land will be barren of timber in a few years.

Not only will a reforestation plan give work to thousands of men, but it will build them up physically and prepare them for farming, it is maintained.
