Snow-plow Drivers Overcome by Fumes

Two men John Norton, Claremont and Norma Wilson, Kin-sale, were overcome by carbon monoxide fumes in the cab of a snowplow early Monday, but escaped serious harm.

When the men became unconscious the machine continued driverless for a short distance. Then it left the road and stalled in deep snow.

John Norton, Claremont tumbled out into the snow. As he slumped over, his arm struck the latch of the cab door, unfastening the catch and allowing him to fall.

The engineer said the men complained to each other of feeling drowsy as fumes from a leaking exhaust seeped into the cabin.

As they neared the approach to No. 7 highway near Brougham Wilson, the driver, slumped unconscious in his seat. The plow swung around and headed for the middle of a nearby service station. Before he could aid his companion, Norton also passed out from the fumes and tumbled out of the cab. When the engine stalled, the fumes ceased and Wilson gradually revived.

Returning on foot, he found Norton lying in the snow. Although weak himself, he managed to resuscitate his companion.

"I couldn't tell anything until I passed out like a light," said Wilson, the driver. "I just seemed to faint and lose control of the plow. It was lucky the snow was so deep for it stopped the plow from heading for the service station."

"I came to gradually and saw Jack lying back in the snow," he continued. "I packed his head with snow and flopped him around. We managed to get to the service station a couple of hundred yards away and then everything was all right."

Wm. R. Armstrong, husband of Mary Wood, died at lot 10, con. 10, Markham (Locust Hill) on Monday, aged 68. Interment took place on Wednesday.

(Continued from page one) Gormley. The statement indicated payments made to H. W. Moorby \$200, W. B. Henderson, \$250, and Pete Brilinger, \$150. At present date settlement has not been made with Roy Brilinger, stated the Markham notice.

The township solicitors advised council by letter that the municipality has power to levy a tax on dance halls, but the tax must not be so high as to be considered prohibitive.

Mr. Roy Andrew presented the auditor's report for 1938 Council scrutinized, and accepted it, paying the Auditor his salary of \$125. The report indicated that bank liability is steadily decreasing while unpaid taxes are going upward. This increase the auditor advised should be given early consideration by the council.

Total unpaid taxes at Dec. 31, last range from \$101 owing on 1930 roll, to \$6,446 in 1936, \$9,048 in 1937, and \$13,024 in 1938. Tax arrears paid the treasurer in 1938 totalled \$13,255.

It is interesting to note that tax penalties more than paid the interest on bank loans for the year.

The bylaw laid over last month giving the Vaughan Telephone Company running rights in the township was passed. It was found that most of the objectionable features were statutory rights given telephone companies, hence there was nothing could be done about it.

The session of the council lasted until after six o'clock, Reeve Kidd, Deputy Reeve Cook and councillors Leary, Kidd and Wells all being present.
