While practising hockey last Thursday in Stouffville Arena Mr. Fred Gibson had the misfortune to break his leg. We hope for a speedy recovery.

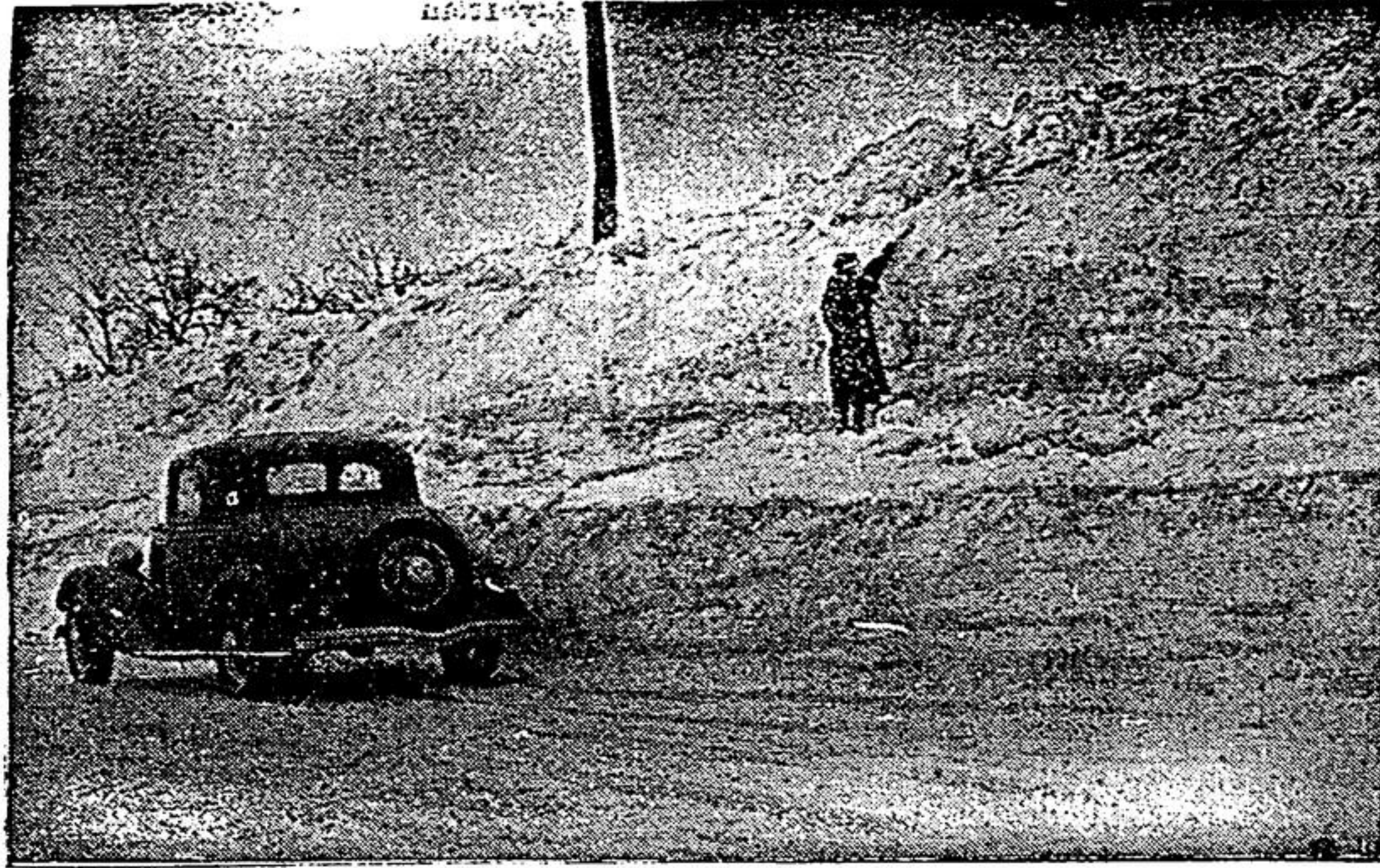
Master William Hunt ushered in Spring on Tuesday with
