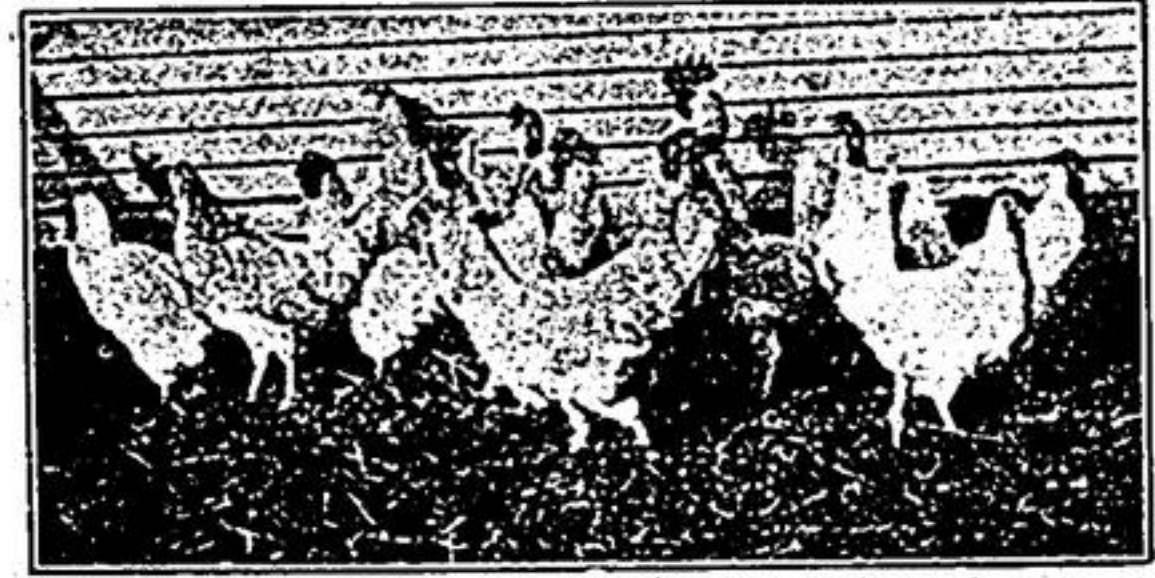

## Dairy Failure

Quite a number of farmers in the Stouffville area are more or less perturbed over the notice received that the Claremont Dairies of Toronto, had gone into bankruptcy. It is said about 25 per day came from the Stouffville area. Most of the milk was contributed from York County, and when the dairy closed its business for lack of funds around \$15,000 was owing for milk and probably \$1,000 more was due the truckers, one local man having an account of \$759 for this kind of transport.  
According to the balance sheet of assets and liabilities, there is sufficient money to meet the indebtedness, but one farmer told the Tribune he would be delighted to receive 75c on the dollar.

## Crowd Swamps Jarvis Auction

The best attended auction sale and one of the largest this year was that on the James Jarvis farm at lot 19, con. 7, Markham, last Thursday. In fact the crowd was so large that Mr. Jarvis felt some who would like to have been bidders could not get near the inner ring within reach of the auctioneer. However, totals came close to what the owner hoped for although as is always the case some things which he valued highly went for little, while others of no importance brought a surprisingly high figure. This was instanced in the case of cattle. The best cow in the barn brought \$53, but the highest cow sold for \$85. Young cattle were in extra good demand, yearlings going at \$35 and 2-year-olds up to \$50. Horses were the one disappointment. There are a lot of them for sale, and prices are

not as high as sellers think they should be. The high animal brought \$131, but Mr. Jarvis placed her at \$160 while one he wanted \$150 for went at \$85. Implements were well snapped up with here and there a big bargain, as in the case of a spring wagon for \$6, a cutter for \$4, but on the other hand the binder sold for \$40, and the best drill for \$40, a good price, but a drill not so good sold for \$71. One set of harrows realized \$20, another set just a little inferior \$4. Somebody bought a few hundred bushels of man-golds at 5 cents a bushel for cheap feed. Strange what some people will do at a sale. There were two hay racks, the poorest selling for more money than the best one. Then in the grain, buyers were hesitant to bid, but after the sale they were hot to buy. Hay sold at \$7 ton. The total proceeds were just \$400 less than a careful appraisal made before the sale, but a few hundred dollars worth of goods had been sold privately.
