

## Horse and Cutter Crash into Child Riding on Sleigh

Uxbridge Woman Dragged  
When Animal Bolts at  
Railway Crossing

A runaway horse dragging an overturned cutter crashed into a sleigh load of children for a joy ride, in Uxbridge on Thursday. Helen Willis, six-year-old daughter of Byron Willis, former mayor and town druggist, was critically injured.

The girl suffered a broken collar bone and serious leg and back injuries when she was struck by the runner of the cutter as the frightened horse dashed into the crowd of children.

The horse was being driven by Mrs. E. Elford who was returning to her home in the country from Uxbridge. As she crossed the railway tracks in the centre of the town the horse bolted, turned the cutter over and dragged Mrs. Elford for some distance.

There were six children on the sleigh and it was believed that all but the injured girl saw the horse coming toward them. Some jumped off the sleigh before sharp runners of the cutter which was dragged on its side, would have mowed them down. Several of the children jumped behind the car of Dr. Frank Mellow which was standing nearby and summoned the doctor for the injured girl.

## OLD-TIME SHOWMAN RECALLED

Many of the "old-timers" in this town and district have been recalling the days when J. A. Cameron, one of the old school of entertainers used to strut his stuff across the stage of garden parties and town functions here. The death of Mr. Cameron was reported a few days ago.

He was a link with the past, and a successful performer in a line of activity that has to quite an extent disappeared.

There is little demand at the present time for the old-time concert company, usually composed of an entertainer, a baritone, or comic soloist or possibly both, an eucutionist or a violinist and the accompanist of the evening. With such companies Mr. Cameron, when in his prime, was popular in this district. One Stouffville gentleman was recalling the first time he ever heard him, being particularly impressed with his interpretation of an old Scotch elder giving a dissertation on the text, "And Job Walked Circumspectly." His dramatic monologue, "It's Funny What a Difference Just a Few Hours Make" was something of a classic.

Jimmy Fox was perhaps the leading contemporary of the late Mr. Cameron in the entertainment field in this province some twenty-five years ago and we understand he is still enjoying good health.

## OLD ELM HAD ITS SHARE OF IRON

East Enders Lament Destruction of Landmark Near Entrance to Cemetery

The large elm tree which stood within 50 feet of the gateway to the cemetery on what is known as the cemetery lane was cut down last week by Randolph Spofford who resides in the frame house within 25 feet of the stately old tree. Mr. Spofford, tenant on this property, maintained that large pieces of limb wood fell from time to time and as it was right on his door-step he viewed the situation with alarm. The question was referred to Councillor Ross Brown as the tree stood on the public roadway. Mr. Brown came to the conclusion that the tree was unsafe. "I think it must have been struck by lightning as large limbs were dead, although the trunk was still sound," said Mr. Brown, who said he hesitated for days ere he could consent to felling the old landmark. M. T. Leavens who owns property adjacent to the roadway where the elm stood, says he was never consulted in the matter, and was disappointed to learn the tree had been felled. He complained to the reeve, but the tree was down, and as the law permits council to remove a tree shown to be a menace to the public, the matter appears to be closed.

A sort of post mortem by east enders was held at the trunk of the old elm after it came down. Arthur Yake declared there is everything from horse shoe nails to logging chain-links in the old trunk and the saw that goes into it will be minus many teeth. Bill Yake, son of Arthur Yake, was willing to wager there are four or five kegs of nails in the tree and as a lad he helped to drive scores of them. It was a favorite meeting spot for the boys 40 years ago and a popular past time was driving iron of one sort or other into the trunk. The tree was at least a hundred years old. If the friendly old elm is really mourned as it appears to be, we hope it will induce action on the part of council, cemetery commission or Horticultural Society to plant two more trees in the same region.

## RURAL PLACES GOING DRY

By next December the number of communities in United States which will be dry as far as the sale of liquor is concerned will be 10,000. There are five states which now prohibit distilled liquors and there are 3,500 communities in these dry states. The rest of them are pretty well scattered, and reports indicate it is in the rural sections that the dry feeling is on the way up. Any community can have local option form of prohibition if it votes for it and that is the way it is being done.

There has been no campaign in a general way, and those with a knowledge of the situation say the number of people who were being killed on country roads had something to do with it; figures also revealed more teen-age youths in trouble and the financial benefits from liquor taxes were found to be too vague.

People in the rural districts had to drive some miles for their liquor and they generally started home with a load under the belt, and after that came the accidents, many of them fatal. That is put down as the main cause for the changed public opinion. There are now 8,500 dry spots and the prediction is that by the end of the year the
