YEARNS FOR PIONEER DAYS

The pioneers of York County had hard work and wolves to worry them, but the main worry of the modern farmer, the annual tax bill, almost missed them entirely.

Bert Kennedy, Agincourt farmer, has in his possession a receipt for taxes paid by his grandfather on the family homestead, then 104 acres in extent, in 1852. It amounted to just £1 17s 5 1-2d, the equivalent of about nine cents an acre.

Mr. Kennedy contrasts that with his peak tax bill in 1932 \$549.98 on 80 acres and his 1938 bill, \$237.18 on the same acreage.

The old tax bill is a very simple affair, written in fine copperplate on a piece of note paper about the size of a visiting card. It reads: "Joseph Kennedy, 1852 taxes; general, £-.19.7; school, £-.17.10 1-2; total £1.17.5 1-2, paid Charles C. Brown, collector."

The present taxes work out at about \$3 an acre, and the peak in 1932 was \$7 an acre. At that time Agincourt district was paying for a new school, pavements and lighting in addition to a high general rate. The school and local improvements are now nearly paid off and the general and county rate has come down to 25.2 mills.

Besides its local improvements and schools, Agincourt has acquired many services since the old days.

Police and fire protection were unknown then, or practically so. Re lief was certainly non-existent and Scarboro had not begun to accumulate its debenture debt.

Mr. Kennedy, however, still expresses doubts that the services supplied have increased in the same ratio as taxes, which are 34 times as much per acre as they were in the so-called "good old days."
