away. Times he has beaten her and now threatens to divorce her if she continues to come. Pray that she may be kept by the power of God and used in leading her husband to Christ.

In returning from a walk one Sunday I passed by the shop of Mr. Chang one of our young Christians. The shutters were up and a little sign hung on the outside of the door read, "Today is Sunday." This is a big step for a young Christian to take and a wonderful testimony. We do praise God for the growth in grace of each member of this family. Formerly in their shop they sold such things as wine, cigarettes, incense and paper money for burning at grave sides, but now thank the Lord these have all gone.

"I would like to buy some gospel posters to put up in my shop" said Mr. Lu as he came in one day. Later I was walking past his little shop in which he sells all sorts of rough pottery, and there was Mr. Lu with several men around him preaching the glorious gospel message, using the posters.

The following is the testimony of Mr. U as he told it at one of our Sunday evening meetings. He was returning from San Ho Chien across the West lake last spring in an overloaded junk. They got within two miles of Hwokin when a terrible storm blew up. The boatman didn't seem to be in a hurry to put down the sail so Mr. U spoke to him about it. The boatman's reply was, what are you so afraid about? Just then a great gust of wind blew over the boat. Some how Mr. U managed to hang on to the upturned boat, he also noticed another man holding on to the rudder who presently began to cry to his gods to save him but nothing seemed to happen, instead the storm got worse. So Mr. U said, "what a fool I am here this man cries to his gods and nothing happens and I don't cry to the true God who I heard about in SanHeChien. So he began to pray, all the time hanging on to the boat and getting weaker. First he asked the Lord to forgive his sins, and save his soul, then he asked the Lord if it was His will to save his body. Thus while holding on to that boat he accepted Christ as his saviour. As soon as he stopped prayer the storm ceased and a boat soon came to their rescue. During Chinese New Year Mr. U along with some of the other Christians went out each day preaching the gospel to the refugees in various public places.

One day last Sept. while Mr. Crossett and I were out for a walk along the lake edge we heard the cries of a small baby and discovered that they came from under a piece of dirty straw matting. On returning home we made inquiries as to an orphanage that could save the baby's life. Since we found there was none we were led to take her in. She had been thrown away at birth and must have been lying there for three days. Baby Virginia Crossett gave to Happiness her cot and cloths

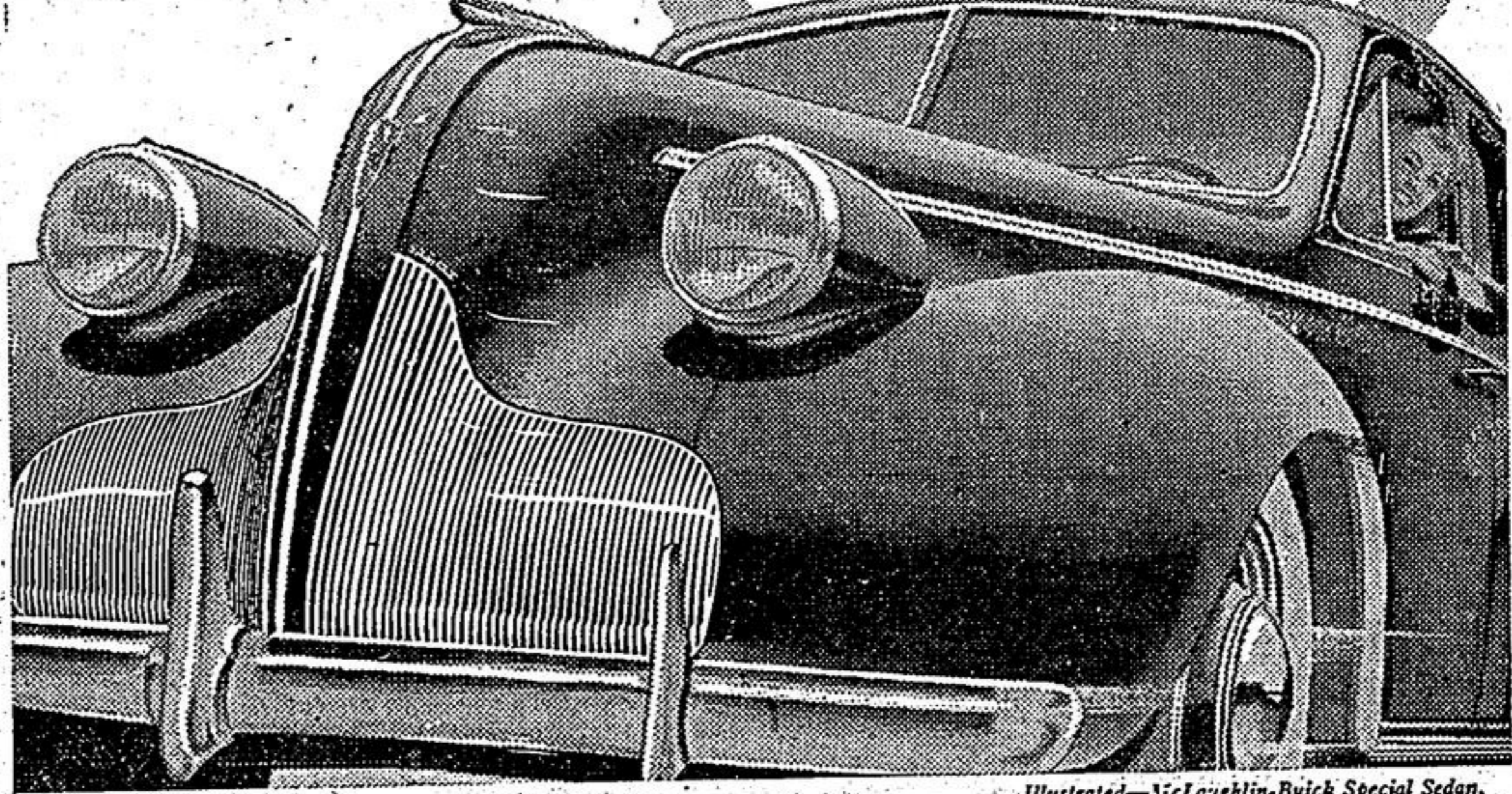
that she had out grown and so she lived with us and was fed on goats milk. When the Crossetts go home on furlough soon Beautiful Happiness will become the daughter of our servant woman. Please pray that she may come to love the Lord Jesus at an early age.

Mr. Gordon Dunn and myself have come here to relieve Mr. and Mrs. Coats who are going to the coast for a much earned rest. Pray that God will bless and use us to His glory and honour while here.
