**Some Sidelights on Fast Time Issue**

On Monday evening, May 1st, there was held a business men's meeting in the upstairs room of the council hall. This meeting was conducted in a business-like manner. A chairman and secretary were appointed and all motions were moved, seconded and voted on by those present. The motion to recognize, Monday (May 22nd) as a holiday was put through on the regular manner, likewise the motion that a petition be circulated and signatures obtained from business men including laborers as to whether they were in favor or against day light saving. The persons who were to circulate the petition were even duly appointed, in short a gentleman's agreement. Many of those who appear in a recent issue as forming the solid front voted at this meeting, but apparently the results of the petition circulated did not meet with their approval and some remarks as to the calibre of those who voted in favor of the day light saving have been hinted at. When some of these so-called ordinary guys enter a store to purchase goods their standing improves somewhat. In fact were it not for these so-called ordinary individuals, merchants could not exist.

We will just further examine ourselves. We have a ninety thousand dollar street which encourages trade, special fancy street lighting which all hands assist in maintaining, lavatory accommodation, etc., and were it not for the whole town contributing these conveniences could not be financed by any small group. Even telephone and hydro rates would be prohibited to any special group.

This is a democracy and democratic principles must not be interfered with. One farmer stated to me that he thought the farmer was being made the goat that he believed that some who live within a few yards of the stores enjoyed seeing clerks panned in for long hours. He cited that truckers and dairy farmers were compelled to accommodate themselves to Toronto's Day Light Saving Time. Farmers are reasonable people. I have talked

with many who have sons and daughters at indoor labor and they recognize what the lack of fresh air and sunshine means to their health, and sunshine means to their health, in fact there was such an increase in T.B. in store clerks in England that no store is allowed to be open after seven o'clock p.m. of any day: If you do not believe it, write to the Board of Trade Dept., of the British Government. 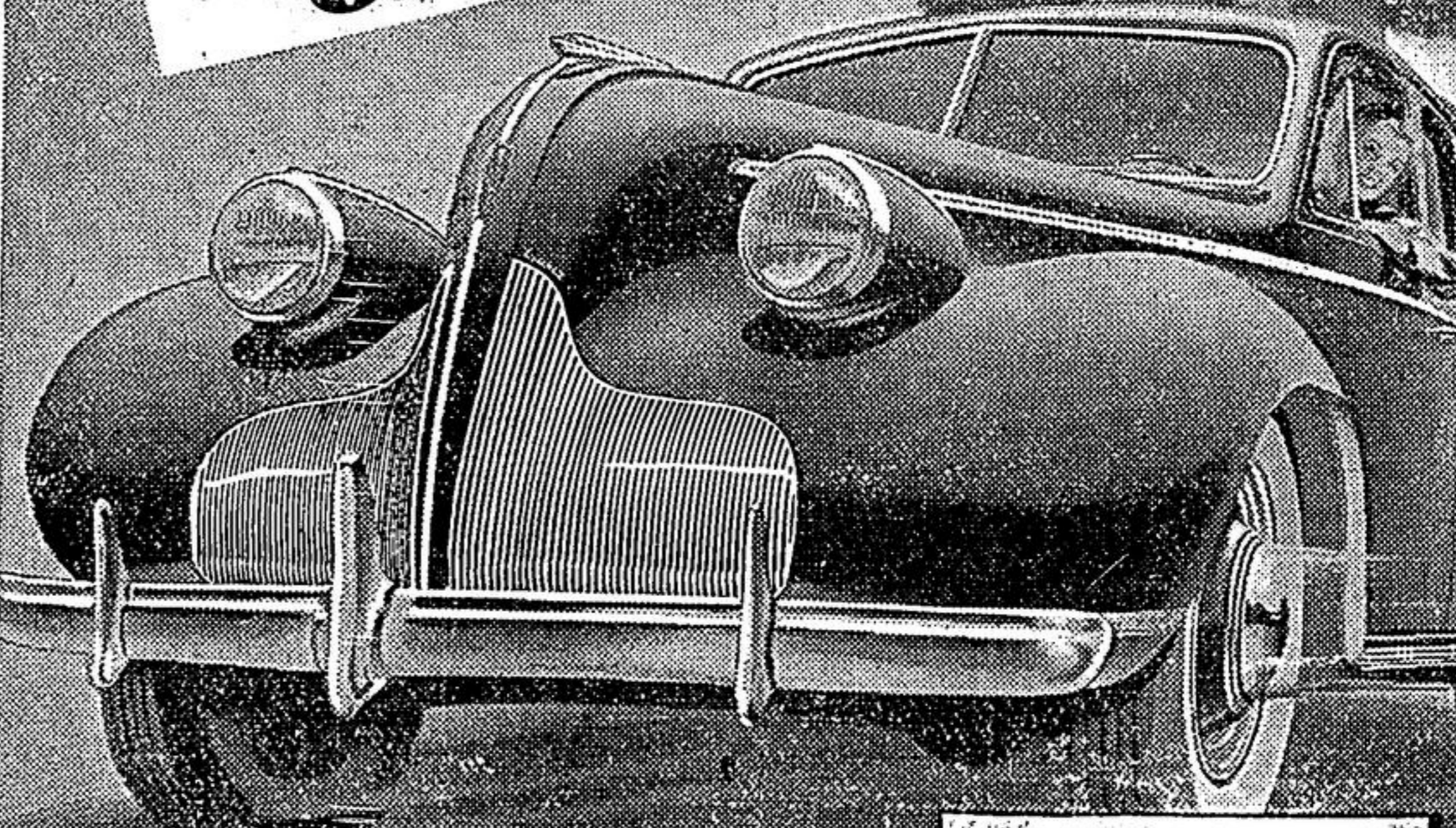
