Walking away with a seven run scoring rally in the 3rd innings, Stouffville won their initial victory on home grounds Saturday afternoon, defeating Hillcrests 12-9 for the first meeting of these two teams in the North Toronto Baseball League.

Hillcrests scored two in the first innings, single in the 4th and 5th, two in the sixth and three in the seventh. Jimmy Hedge took the Toronto mound until the 3rd when he was replaced by Johnson, who was removed for Lefty Wright in the seventh. Manager Bill Dennett used Acheson a newcomer behind the plate.

"Dinty" Hodgins turned in a nice innings effort for the locals, chalking up several notable strike-outs, including Buster Mills and Gordon Baker, stand-outs last year in the Western City group.

After two were out in the third, some hefty hitting by Holden, Stover, Penneck, Hood, Wideman and Clark, brought in seven runs to put Stouffville well out in front. Cook and Holden crossed the rubber for two more in the 4th while a single counter was added in the 6th and two in the 7th.

Neither "Tip" Anderson or Lou Lehman were in action in Saturday's game.

This Saturday Manager Doug Munro will lead his Toronto Pears into Memorial Park for their first return game with the local squad.

Mennonites Debate Attitude on War

Also Talked About Christian Attitude Toward Trade Unions, at Young People's Rally.

The annual Young People Convention of the Ontario Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church was held at Markham, on May 24th. Delegations were present from many parts of the province, and the three sessions of the convention were attended by capacity audiences.

The convention will be held by the President, Alvin Farmer of Gormley. Prayer was offered by Rev. S. S. Shantz, of Kitchener, after which the local Pastor, Rev. P. G. Lehman, gave the address of welcome which was responded to by the President. Several committees were appointed and music was rendered by the Stouffville Society. Miss Helen Pipher, of New Dundee brought a searching essay on "The Meaning of True Consecration."

In the afternoon, two helpful topics were dealt with, namely, "The Christian's Attitude Towards Trade Unions," and "The Christians Attitude in The Event of Another War." These discussions were both timely and helpful, and suited to the times in which we live.

The evening session opened with a lively song service led by H. D. Huber, of Kitchener. Among the many resolutions submitted was a declaration of loyalty and affection for their Majesties, King George and Queen Elizabeth, which was followed by the singing of the National Anthem. Rev. W. M. Shantz brought the evening oration, taking as his subject: "Abundant Life," which was a stirring appeal to the attentive audience.

The convention will be held in Stratford next year, while Howard Reichard, of Toronto, B. E. Reinhart, of Stayner and Theodore Warder of Kitchener are the officers for the ensuing year.

This convention was one of the largest held, and the testimonies of this noble crowd of consecrated young people left its imprint on the community.
