Ratepayers to Seek Better Road, from 4th to Yonge Street

The standard of building in Unionville is expected to be raised considerably by a new building by-law which the trustees of that place hope to enact in the near future. At the regular sitting of Markham Township Council on Monday, the trustees requested council and building inspector, Walter Craig, to meet with themselves and the village ratepayers sometime this month to discuss the proposed new by-law.

Application was also received at the meeting by a petition representing over 75 per cent of the ratepayers on the Doncrest Rd., a portion of concession 2, to have council undertake road improvement there. The ratepayers would share the cost over a period of five years, with an annual charge not to exceed \$2.40 per hundred feet of frontage. At the expiration of the five year period the council would assume the road, and maintenance. The request was held over for consideration.

Nelson Boynton waited on the members with regard to a strip of road from Victoria Square to Elgin Mills, Yonge Street. Mr. Boynton stated that a petition was underway to have the road taken into the County system.

"There is not enough gravel used on this strip for the amount of traffic it bears," said Mr. Boynton.

It was agreed that maintenance of the road was difficult owing to the increased traffic, and Councillor Barber stated that a paved road would certainly relieve the 2nd and 3rd concessions, bringing the traffic to the 4th concession highway.

Council agreed to look into the matter and see that suitable protection was given. Assessment court was re-opened with Phil. Willows receiving a reduction of \$100 in his assessment owing to his recent fire. An appeal of Miss A. Liveridge on Lots 13-14, Con. 2, was dismissed.

Relief for the month totalled \$710.73.

Claremont Village to Renovate Fire Fighting Equipment

Apparent neglect was the keynote of the report brought in by H. G. McIntyre on Claremont's fire-fighting equipment, at a public meeting there on Tuesday night.

"There is nothing wrong with the running equipment that can not be fixed for a very small sum," Mr. McIntyre told the village trustees.

At the conclusion of his report the speaker made various recommendations which he and his committee had drawn up as necessary. It was suggested that a fire commissioner be appointed from the trustees, and that a fire brigade be formed at once.

"And needless to say, a 1939 license should be procured for the apparatus," said Mr. McIntyre.

The estimated cost of renovating the outfit was placed at \$75.

The decision of the trustees is to hold a public meeting next Tuesday night, June 13, to organize a fire brigade, and appointed the necessary officials to go with it.

On Thursday night the ratepayers held their first meeting to deal with the Fire truck situation. The village trustees called for the opinions of those present over the reported un-cared for condition of the fire truck. Trustee Pretty stated that a new truck would be favoured by the municipal body.

"A new truck would not be any better," said Walter Ward, "if it was not properly looked after."

"Three years ago I was told the truck wasn't worth repairing," said Mr. Ed. Lewis.

Mac. Forsyth, a former trustee, stated that at the time of a recent fire, the nozzle connections were so corroded it was impossible to get a workable stream from them. H. G. McIntyre rehearsed his experiences with the present fire outfit, and said that he felt there was no reason why the truck couldn't be put in shape, as far as he knew. At the conclusion of the meeting it was moved by Mac. Forsyth and seconded by William Burkett that H. G. McIntyre head a committee to look over the truck and pumps, and present a report on Tuesday. Mr. McIntyre suggested for his committee the names of Len Pikey, Jos. Ward, Ben. Kilpatrick and one of the trustees.

Township Will Buy Road Oil

Whitchurch Township this week will obtain prices on a car lot of road oil for use throughout the township this summer and on the busy lake roads, it was decided at the Township Council meeting on Saturday. Deputy Reeve Jess Cook stated that he had heard some lake residents express the opinion in favor of oil and others in favor of calcium as a dust layer, but he was of the opinion that oil was the cheapest, and did a more lasting job.

The meeting was the lightest on record for some time. A resolution sent to the council for their signatures, and calling on the Department of Highways to get busy on widening Yonge street at the "bottle-neck" met with some opposition from Councillor Kidd who thought the council would be better bending their energy on inducing the Department to construct the roads that run through Whitchurch. "I am not opposed to them widening Yonge street, if the Dept. can be prevailed on, however," continued Mr. Kidd, "but I am not in favor of that resolution as it is worded." The councillor said that if roads like the fourth are improved it would help to relieve the Yonge street congestion.

Reeve Toole said he was in sympathy with the resolution, and was not adverse to voting for it. "I think Yonge street is the busiest highway in the pro-

vince," he declared.

Councillors Leary and Wells thought something should be done to widen the bottleneck, and Deputy Reeve Cook said the street railway presented the big problem in widening. However, the resolution was not put to a vote.

The annual bylaw for collecting garbage at Lake Musselman and Lake Wilcox was passed. Percy Ash will again be in charge of Wilcox, receiving \$200 and George Windsor will collect at Musselman's and will receive \$124. The cost is borne by the ratepayers in the areas served.

A resolution introduced by Councillors Kidd and Leary requires the assessor (F.C. Cummings) to make his assessment around Lake Wilcox and Lake Musselman during the month of July when the owners are most likely to be at their cottages.

Road accounts presented for payment totalled only \$256, a

record low mark. A few small general accounts were ordered paid, also the hospitalization account of \$170.75.
