This letter was written, in all likelihood, from Paul's hired house in Rome (Acts 28: 30), where Paul was kept in durance for two years while he waited to appear before Nero. Philemon was a Colossian believer who owed his conversion to Paul (See verse 19b). The letter concerns the return of a runaway slave.

Verse 2-"Apphia ... Archippus." Apphia is a feminine name and refers doubtless to Philemon's wife. Archippus was apparently a young preacher, perhaps their son. None can speak with certainty, though, as to this.

Verse 3 .- Grace ... and peace:' It is the customary apostolic salutation uniting those of the Gentiles who said "Grace" (Charis, or Gracia) and the Jews who said "Peace" (Shalom) in ordinary greetings. Both are united in Christ. Verse 4-'Making mention of

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
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
