Building Zones Set for Unionville

Restrictions, However, Are Moderated When Residents Object to Severity and Committee in Charge

Building restriction dividing Unionville into three zones were agreed to last week by a mass meeting of ratepayers in the township hall, assembled by the Unionville Board of Trade.

All the area from the railway south to Hagerman was classed as a first-class residential district with the exception of the corner of the Kennedy road and No. 7 Highway. From Cedarbrook farm south to the cement bridge was termed second-class residential.

Between the bridge and the railway continues to be a business area, and the industrial section along the railway and No. 7 Highway was enlarged on the plea of Findlay Pollard, local station agent.

The meeting at first promised to be stormy, many ratepayers objecting to the restrictions and the personnel of the committee in charge.

The objections brought a reduction in restrictions in the first-class residential area from \$3,500 to \$2,500 when it was claimed a seven-roomed brick clad house could be built for less than \$3,000, exclusive of the owner's work.

Taxpayers who spoke included Charles Maynard, A. L. Brown, H.H. Powers, Mr. McLellan, Mr. Pierre, Mr. Sheldon and Len Rainey. The standing committee which will carry the business to completion are: C.A. Smith, Courtney Proctor, J. W. Perkin, E. J. Stiver, and A. L. Brown.
