### \$12,500 in German Money for Farm in Pickering

A Pickering township farm was sold for \$12,500 cash last month through the C. R. Purcell Co., farm realtors. The land is known as the W. A. Knox property on the Brock Road, and is Lot 18, in the Sixth concession, township of Pickering, the location being just north of the village of Brougham on No. 7 highway.

The parcel contains 125 acres of level clay loam land with 10 acres of bush and there is a solid brick residence of 10 rooms surrounded by shade trees and orchard. The ninety-foot bank barn of steel construction which replaced one recently burned, is hip-roofed with concrete and steel equipment in the base and has both electric light and water. The southern exposure is lighted by an almost continuous row of windows. There is space for 45 head of cattle.

The purchaser is George Zimmer of Toronto, one of the number of purchasers who have secured farms most of whom have got their money out of Germany for investment in Canada. Just recently Herbert Scheurman, son of a German shipping owner, purchased for cash the old Baron Korff farm at Oshawa.

The Knox farm purchaser who formerly operated a line of agents' furnishing stores secures possession in the fall when a German agricultural expert will arrive to take over the direction of farm activities. Dairy and poultry will be the two specialties.

for Ralph Connor upon taxation costs in the recent action over ownership of a strip of land along the east shore of Lake Musselman, which action was dismissed against the municipality, with costs to be paid by the plaintiff Connor. That portion of the costs incurred by the municipality in defending this suit are recoverable from Mr. Connor in the usual manner, and amounts to \$158.

Councillor Leary and Deputy Reeve Cook introduced a resolution instructing the clerk to settle the account of the township schools for transportation of children to Toronto to see the King and Queen, deducting the costs of flags at 3 1-2 cents a piece supplied each school.

Reeve Toole introduced the matter of constructing a suitable shed for housing the grader, stating that half the cost would be paid by the Dept. of Highways, as would half the cost for insurance on the machine, which the Dept. recommends to be taken out.

Specifications for a building 40 feet long were drawn up and local contractors will be asked to tender on construction.
