It is preserved in Mr. Reesor's bible which he received from his mother.

Mr. Clendening is engaged at the Creighton Mine, 12 miles from the city, doing underground work. 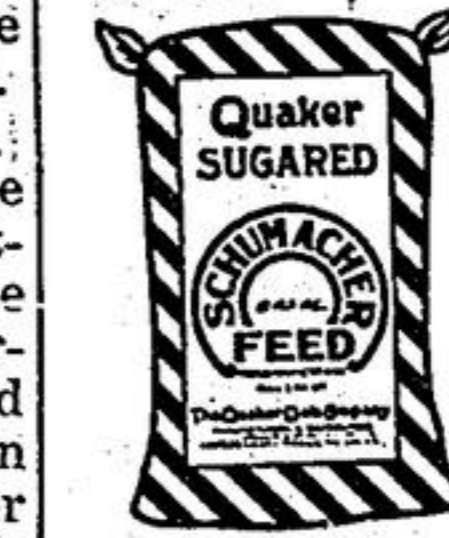

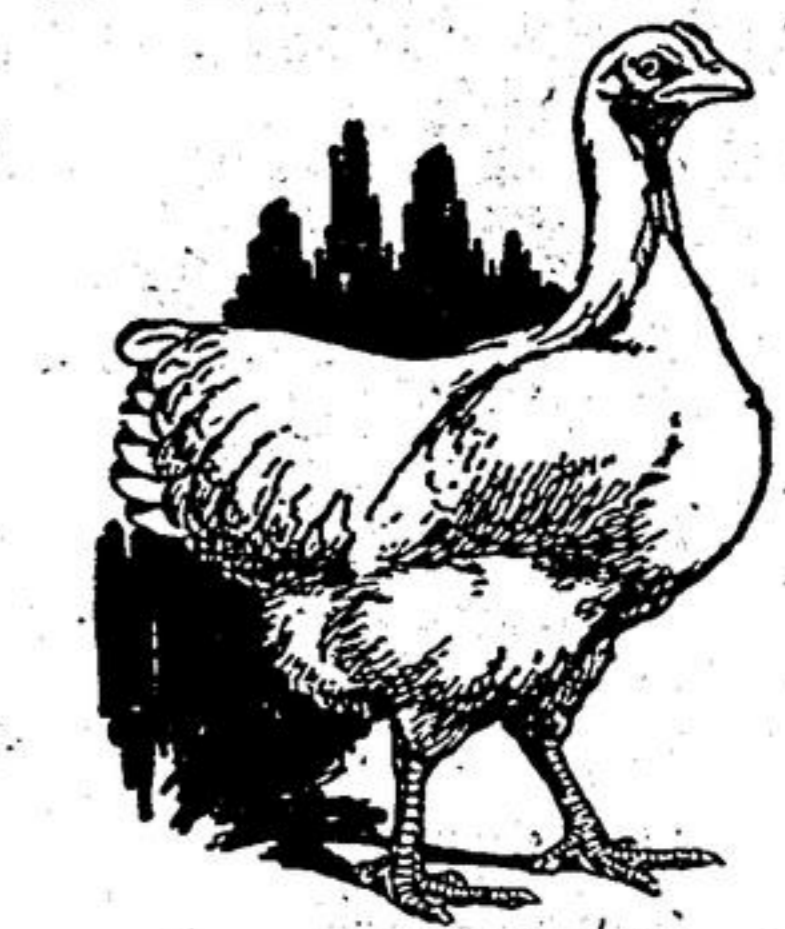
