Those of us who attended the first re-union of Locust Hill school, old boys and girls, had a most enjoyable time. About three hundred attended. After numberless, "How de dos", and "Remember when's—" a few past pupils and trustees spoke. The school was first opened a short distance north of the present site in 1860 and the first meeting of the trustees was held on Jan. 11th, 1860. It is recorded in 1862 that ten cords of wood were purchased at 4 shillings, 4 pence per cord. In 1864 the present building was erected, and we remember that about this time English currency passed out. In 1867 David Tran was elected trustee, in 1868 the present woodshed was built, in 1869 the well dug and new pump was bought, also prizes were awarded to scholars. In 1875 a motion was passed that all non resident pupils should be expelled. Later the motion was rescinded. In 1890 a new fence was erected, and in Fred Pike's talk we learned that six teachers were hired in one year. The salary to-day is nearly three times what it was then. The same "ole swimmin' ole" is still doing active service. Mr. Lewis Piper, Mrs. Sherk, Mrs. Hoover, Dr. Thos. Armstrong were the other speakers. Congratulations were tendered those on the program. Sports were enjoyed, Mr. E. Willby acting as official starter. Supper was served at tables on the lawn. Miss Hyland, present teacher read several letters of regret from former teachers and pupils at great distances, Texas, California Western Canada, Montreal, etc., who were unable to be present but who hoped all would have a good time and God's Blessing.
