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**UXBRIDGE DOCTOR IN COURT**

Oshawa, July 12—Dr. Robert Wilson of Uxbridge, free on bail awaiting trial at Uxbridge on charges arising out of a disturbance which he created at that town on Monday night, June 26, went on another rampage Tuesday night. This time the fracas occurred at Port Perry and as a result he appeared before Magistrate F. S. Ebbs in Oshawa, on a charge of resisting a police officer. He was remanded in custody until July 13 when a further remand was made of one week.

Bail was fixed at \$2,500, but through his counsel, J. P. Mangin, K.C., arrangements were made that if a mental examina-

tion at the county jail shows him in need of treatment that he may be removed to Whitby Hospital.

Nothing of the doctor's examination could be learned.

The Port Perry incident started when Dr. Wilson entered the office of Dr. G. M. Rennie. When informed that the doctor was not in he refused to leave and became abusive. Chief of Police Roy St. John was called and after a struggle succeeded in placing him under arrest. He was taken to the Port Perry lockup for the night where he continued to shout and create a disturbance until 4:00 a.m. in the morning.

Monday, June 26, in Uxbridge the trouble arose when he became noisy on the street. He

was charged with being a nuisance on the street, using obscene language and resisting arrest.

**GASOLINE TAX REVENUE UP BY \$1,214,970**

Toronto, July 12—Revenue to the amount of \$6,014,976, accrued to the provincial treasury through the operation of the gasoline tax for the months of April, May and June of this year.

The figure compares with the amount of \$4,700,000 for the same months of last year, for an increase of slightly over 26 per cent. Increase of 25 per cent in the provincial tax accounts for nearly all the extra revenue.
