**COLOURFUL FOOD RICH IN VITAMINS**  
Dr. Victor Heiser, who believes that pharmacy is an older science than medicine, last week gave advice on diet, pointed out that the simplest way to be sure of securing enough vitamins is to eat bright, colorful foods.  
Yellow foods, such as butter, corn, carrots, eggs are rich in vitamin in which is essential for good eyesight.  
Greens are rich in minerals, and in vitamins A, B and C.  
With a variety of fresh, gently cooked vegetables, no healthy person need worry about vitamin deficiency. But it is of vital importance to remember that violent boiling or prolonged frying kills delicate vitamins.  
The ideal diet, and the safest for delicate digestion, is light meals, simply cooked, with portions of rare meats, raw vegetables.
