## WOMAN TRAMPLED TO DEATH BY HORSE

A bolting horse resulted in the death of Mrs. Wesley Russnell in the barnyard of her home on the tenth concession of Reach township, just east of Uxbridge town on Thursday. The accident happened in full view of her husband who is a distant cousin of Mr. Ira Russnell of Stouffville.

Her son, Stewart, 22, and her husband were trying to capture the horse to put it in the stable when it took fright and dashed for the barnyard gate.

"My wife ran out with another woman to try to stop the horse," said Mr. Russnell. "As it approached my wife waved a broom. Then she suddenly lost balance and fell directly in front of the horse. It jumped on her with its full weight, inflicting

terrible injuries. She died two hours later. The horse quieted down in a few minutes and has given no trouble since. It is a seven-year-old black Percheron. The son, Stewart, drove 70 miles an hour over gravel road, he said to get Dr. J. McClintock at Uxbridge.

"The horse had always been quite friendly and I am sure he had no intention of trampling on her," said Stewart.

Funeral service was held from the late home. Interment was made in Uxbridge cemetery.

## GENEROUS PRIZE CONTRIBUTOR PASSES

A. J. H. Echardt, known throughout the local farming community, died at his home in Toronto on Friday, in his 78th year.

Mr. Echardt was a generous contributor to agricultural fall fairs and plowing matches in York and adjoining counties. The "Echardt Silver Plate" is a prized trophy in numerous homes surrounding Stouffville.

Mr. Echardt was born in Unionville, son of the late William and Sarah Echardt, and descendant of early pioneers, who came from Pennsylvania to settle in Markham township. His grandfather Peter Echardt settled in Unionville in 1793.

He is survived by his widow, Alberta, two sons, and one daughter. Funeral service was in Trinity United Church.
