Sunday School Lesson

Lesson September 17
MICAH: A MESSENGER OF SOCIAL JUSTICE

Golden Text—"What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?—Micah 6:8
THE LESSON AS A WHOLE
Approach to the Lesson

The ministry of the prophets was always corrective. They were sent by God to call his people back to the path of obedience. While prediction of things to come was included in their messages, this by no means exhausted their content. They were men who spoke for God in "days of" declension. They had, therefore, an authority which no servant of God has today, so far as any civil community is concerned. Israel was a theocracy. God was their acknowledged King. The prophets were his messengers to his own covenant people. The ministers of Christ today are a gift to the Church from the ascended Lord (Eph. 4:7-14). They are given for the perfecting of the saints, not for the regulating of the world. On the other hand, they are called to proclaim, fearlessly, those principles of righteousness upon which Christ's Kingdom is to be set up in order that men may see their true condition before God and turn to him in repentance.

The Historical Setting
Micah, called a Morashite because of the place of his birth, a prophet to Israel and Judah, was, for the most part, contemporary with Isaiah, and prophesied in the reigns of Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah (1:1), and to Israel after the mass of the people had been carried captive by the Assyrians. This was in the eighth century B.C. He predicted our Saviour's birthplace (5:2).
Verse by Verse
Micah 3:1—"Is it not for you to know judgment?" Micah addressed himself to the leaders of Israel, who should have known the Law and were responsible to instruct the people.

Verse 2—"Who hate the good, and love the evil." Instead of obeying the law, they deliberately chose the path of disobedience. This led to grievous ill-treatment of the poor and needy, among them.
Verse 3—"Who also eat the flesh of my people." The common people suffered terribly because of the

iniquity of those in high places.

Verse 4—"He will even hide his face." If men spurn the Word of God in the days of prosperity, they need not expect his help in adversity.

Verse 5—"Prophets that make my people err . . . and cry, Peace." It is folly to expect peace and security when God's Word is despised. In this day men plan for a warless world, but their hopes must be in vain so long as the Prince of Peace is rejected.

Verse 6—"Ye shall not have a vision." Until the will of God becomes supreme in the life, men cannot rightly expect the divine approval, nor receive enlightenment from heaven.

Verse 7—"There is no answer of God." It is in vain to call upon God for guidance or deliverance while refusing to obey.

Verse 8—"Full of power by the Spirit of the Lord." The same Holy Spirit who energizes God's servants in this age had given to Micah boldness and authority to speak unflinchingly.

Verse 9—"Hear this, I pray you." Micah pleaded with the leaders to return to God.

Verse 10—"They build up Zion with blood." In their efforts to aggrandize themselves and build up a great city, they cared not how the poor suffered.

Verse 11—"Reward . . . hire . . . money." These were their real gods. Leaders, priests, and false prophets were concerned only for temporal gain (like Balaam, Jude 11, and Simon the sorcerer, Acts 8:20-23).

Verse 12—"Zion shall be plowed as a field. Because of their sins, Zion would cease to be a place of habitation and become an open field. This prophesy has been literally fulfilled.

Chap. 6:6—"Wherewith shall I come before the Lord?" What is it that God values as man seeks to come into his holy presence? Is it ritual service?

Verse 7—"Shall I give my first-born?" Among the heathen, sons and daughters were sacrificed to idols. Does God desire such offerings?

Verse 8—"What doth the Lord require of thee?" Note that the question is addressed to God's covenant people. It is not the way of salvation that is here emphasized, but the obedience that should characterize those who are already recognized as the children of God. The Heart of the Lesson
God wants reality. He will never permit us to substitute ritualism or liturgical services for true heart obedience to His Word. To profess great zeal for the honor of the Lord, while ruthlessly despising those in humbler circumstances, than ourselves, or turning away with indifference from their need, is abhorrent to him who died that all men might be saved (1 John 3:17). We honor God as we obey his Word.

Special Lesson Topics and Truths
Christ, the Hope of Israel, Micah, like the other prophets, sets forth Israel's wretched internal condition and emphasizes the folly of relying upon outward observances in order to win Jehovah's favor. He calls the people to judge themselves in the light of his purpose to send a Saviour. He alone can bring in the promised blessing, establishing the Kingdom of God upon earth.
Hating Good and Loving Evil. This is characteristic of the unregenerate man. It is this that makes the new birth so important, apart from which no man can enter the Kingdom of God. The spiritual rebirth makes a man love what God loves and hate what he hates (John 3:6b).
The declaration of Micah 6:8 must not be mistaken for the Gospel. It is not a setting forth of the way men may be saved. It tells us what God requires of those who are already in covenant relationship with himself. It is only the regenerated man who can fulfill the conditions there laid down. It is a grave mistake to substitute this for the message of reconciliation through the cross of Christ, as many have done.
