LOCKED HORNS

Answering a call near Claremont on Wednesday morning Dr. S. T. Bodendistel noticed a couple of cattle belonging to Mr. Ross Kester with their horns locked as if in combat. The veterinary estimated that the animals would easily free themselves, but an hour later returned over the same road there were the two animals still hooked together. Realizing something was wrong the doctor found on investigation that each animal had a curled horn with just open space enough at the end to permit the horns of either animal to lock together and form a very solid link. With the aid of one or two farmers the cattle were freed, but they would have died that way so far as their own power went to unlock the horns. "We have heard of such incidents among buffalo, but I never saw it before among cattle," observed the V.S.

No. 7, Markham, Bloomington, Stouffville, Dickson Hill, No. 19 Markham; Mongolia, Lemonville, totalling a couple of hundred children.
T. J. Haig from Guelph Agricultural College addressed the crowd on the new soil survey campaign. It was explained that since the farms have been growing crops upward of a hundred years, certain elements had been removed. The Department will examine your soil from samples submitted, and advise you on the lacking elements in your particular ground. About fifteen farmers availed themselves of the opportunity and submitted samples at the fair. Others may do so later.

Some Facts About the British Fleet

Local news is unusually hard to gather these days and wherever small groups are seen the topic under discussion is almost always the war.
Relative strength of the different arms of the navy, their duties and strength leads to plenty of controversy so we publish the following interesting data
Battleships - Generally, but not always, the largest ships in the fleet. Built as floating fortresses, they are heavily armed and heavily armored. Largest afloat to-day are of 35,000 tons, although Britain has two 40,000 ton ships being completed. Carry guns as heavy as 16-inch and armor plating as thick as 12 inches. Cost is around \$6,000,000, and war complement more than 1,300 officers and men. Speed, 23 knots (26 m.p.h.)
Battle Cruisers - Can be as large, or larger, than battleships (Britain's Hood, for instance, is 42,000 tons), but they sacrifice safety to speed. Carrying equally heavy guns, their armor plating is reduced to make them lighter and faster. Cost is about half that of battle ship except in the case of Hood and war complement is about the same. Speed, however, exceeds 31 knots (35 m.p.h.)
Aircraft Carriers - Just what the name implies, floating air-dromes from which land planes can be launched and on which they can be landed. Lightly armed and practically without armor, they have a speed of about 30 knots and carry a war complement of about 700 officers and men. Cost about \$2,000,000.
Cruisers - Ranging in size from 10,000 ton to 4,000 tons. Larger ones were built by Britain as an answer to German's "pocket battleships", which are really heavily armed and armored cruisers. The largest cruisers carry guns up to 8 inch calibre, smaller ones reduce these to 4 inch guns. War complements are between 100 officers and men 400. Speeds vary between 30 and 33 knots (up to 38 m.p.h.) and costs vary between \$3,000,000 and \$500,000.
Destroyers (including flotilla leader) - Small, speedy warships used mainly for torpedo attacks on larger vessels, repelling of destroyer attacks on their own fleets, convoying of merchantmen, and destruction of submarines. Speed is up to 42 knots (48 m.p.h.) main armament is from torpedo tubes, and armor is negligible. Crew consists of something over 100 officers and men.

submersible warships, capable of cruising away from bases for weeks at a time. Armed with torpedoes and guns and, in some cases, also carrying small sea-planes. Submerged speed is low about 10 knots (just over 11 m.p.h.) but on the surface some can go as quickly as 23 knots (26 m.p.h.) Can be used legitimately against warships or merchantmen so long as warning is given of intention to sink a merchantman and its crew is given opportunity to reach a place of safety. Sinking of the Athenia, for instance, was obviously not a legitimate act of war.
