More Sheep Killed in Uxbridge Twp.

Uxbridge Township council met at Goodwood on Saturday with all members present, Reeve Ashenurst presiding. Mrs. Clara Mills appeared before council and asked damages of \$25 alleged caused her crop of oats by water running off the road. She claimed the ditch was blocked.

The Department of Municipal Affairs sent a copy of a bill known as the Vacant Land Cultivation Act, which empowers council to pass bylaws for granting permits to any persons to enter upon and work said lands, and gather the crop. No action was taken.

The Department of Labour requested a list of all gravel pits in the municipality.

E. G. Purvis of East Whitby advised council that October 19 had been set for meeting of the County Municipal Association at Sunderland, and urged council to be present or send their assessor. North Ontario Plowmen were given a grant of \$25.00.

Mr. E. R. Good of the Brierbush Hospital, Stouffville, personally invited members to attend the opening of the new wing next Saturday and asked them to appoint a member to a Board of Directors to be set up. The council thanked Mr. Good and later council appointed the reeve to the board.

Mutton-eating dogs have again been at large, and two bills were presented for payment, one of \$23 to Ed. Norton for two killed and one injured, and \$35 to George Jones for three killed and one injured. Both claimants took the necessary oath. E. W. Evans, valuator, was paid \$2 for his services.

He is also the editor of a magazine for the blind "The Lamp," which brings light to many that sit in darkness.
