BIG VANDORF AUCTION NEXT SATURDAY

If anything like reasonable weather prevails, the crowd of farm men and women that will take in the big auction sale at Vandorf this coming Saturday, will probably resemble a large country fair. More than one thousand articles in furniture, kitchen ware, etc., will pass under the hammer when the entire contents of the White House is sold. This property is frequently called the Kingsley Farm, but for the past year it has been the John Franks Farm, because a minister in Toronto by this name conducted the large hostelry there.
 Owing to the war which is calling the men to the colors, there is no longer need for this place which housed 150 men in grand style. Articles of every description from wealthy homes in Toronto, plus hundreds of dollars in cash have been poured into the place since Rev. John Franks took it over.
 In addition to this enormous sale of household goods, the entire herd of milch cows, the farm horses, hay, grain, roots, etc., must all be disposed of without reserve. Some say it can't be done in a day, even with this sale commencing at 10 a.m. Two auction rings will be set up, and Messrs. Prentice and Prentice will start on the hour, intending to dispose of everything before night. The farm is alongside the Whitechurch Township hall and is widely known in the county.

Stock Killed by Unknown Marauder

A strange case has arisen in Markham township over the killing and mutilating of a number of animals last Friday night. George Jennings a Kennedy Road resident just south of Unionville came out to his barn in the morning to find two of his pigs dead and practically slashed to pieces. Across the road his neighbour visited his hen house in the morning to find twenty-five Rock roosters destroyed. A few were not quite dead but were in such condition that they had to be put out of the way. A third neighbour, Mr. Rodick found a sow badly chewed about the head and rump. Robert Tuley lost three goats in a similar manner just a couple of days earlier. Constable B. Gayman who is investigating stated that at first the mutilations looked like the work of a knife, but later concluded that some animal, presumably a dog, had made the killings. No sounds of marauders were apparently heard, although one farmer claimed he heard some short yelps once during the night.
