Chief Business is Passing Accounts

Reeve A. E. Weldon presided over the monthly meeting of the village council on Monday evening, when the main item of business was checking and passing an accumulation of accounts. New work done on the hydro lines costs \$181 for material, but the bill for labor has not yet been presented. At the same time meters costing \$353 were ordered paid.

A half dozen general accounts for supplies were ordered paid, and this almost concluded the business.

The reeve was requested to take charge of the memorial wreath and arrange a suitable function for Remembrance Day when it may be placed at the park as in other years.

Persons who fail to pay promptly for electricity and water will find their supplies cut off. Threats were issued the past two weeks, and now definite action is to follow. In the case of water eight or nine will find the tap dry after a day or two, as the order was to not stand in the way of the law which provides for definite payment.

No Enemy Aliens on Relief Roll

So far this winter no enemy aliens have applied for relief in Markham Township it was revealed by Clerk Hoover at the regular meeting of the council held at Unionville on Monday. Several such persons have been included in the roll on previous years, but since none have so far applied this year, no specific stand has been taken by the township. Relief for the last month totalled \$425.81.

A by-law was given its three readings, authorizing the construction of a gravel road as a local improvement on a highway in the township known as the Doncrest Road. A request was received in regard to placing a temporary bridge on the townline between Scarboro and Markham, where the County is placing a new abutment in the present bridge over the Rouge.

The T.T.C. monthly report showed an operating profit of \$525.23 and an increase in passenger revenue of \$192.00.

Permission was granted to erect fence around graves of the Echardt family plot in the cemetery at Lot 7, Con. 6.

Mrs. Frisby of Unionville waited on council, and asked that steps be taken to have a building, owned by Mr. Phil Dixon, removed from its present site, which is in the roadway close to the Frisby home. The particular shed in question Mrs. Frisby said was formerly shielded from public view by a church shed, but since this has been removed, and the owner refuses to pay taxes on it, it should be either torn down or placed elsewhere.

Claim for damages by Ed. Tooley, on several goats killed was laid over, until an effort is made to round up the dogs believed responsible for the killings.

A new agreement which has been drawn up with the police village of Unionville was passed, and gives the village a 1/4 mill higher tax rate, making it 1 1/2 mills.
