### BUSINESS IS BRIEF AT FINAL MEETING

Sheep claims totalling \$70.90 were ordered paid by Whitchurch Township council on Friday. James Crochart, con. 2, suffered loss from dogs attacking his sheep fold on or about Nov. 24. Eight animals were killed.

A request for rebate of taxes on the John Franks farm at Vandorf drew no action. The letter pointed out that the farm had been operated at a loss of \$1,800. Rev. Mr. Franks, rector of a down town Toronto church used the property on a large scale as a haven for destitute men, and had paid the taxes of \$84.24. The place was largely supported, it is understood by the good graces of Toronto citizens. Owing to the men enlisting it was closed up as a hostel this fall.

Relief for November totalled \$96.08, and hospitalization over which council can exercise no control amounted to \$87. Road accounts included a list of small items under ten dollars, and the following:
