FARMERS KEEN ON SALE OF HOGS TO BRITAIN

Stouffville farmers and all producers of swine in Ontario are deeply interested in the agreement signed last week between the Canadian Government and the government of the United Kingdom, whereby the British Government has agreed to buy all the bacon and ham Canada can produce.

By the agreement, Britain will take nearly 5,000,000 lbs. of bacon and ham weekly, if Canada is able to export that amount, up to Oct. 31, 1940, the date of expiration of the agreement. All purchases are expected to be made through a hog marketing board which will probably be set up by the Dominion Government.

Britain will pay a fixed price for Wiltshire sides of \$20.18 for an English hundredweight of 112 pounds. This figure would approximate 9 cents a pound live weight for hogs, but it was explained by Ottawa officials that to keep up the weekly movement provided for in the agreement it would probably be necessary to vary hog prices here from season to season. When deliveries normally are heavy, the price would have to be under the 9 cents and in certain other seasons considerably over that figure. The British Government will look after the
